Instructions to authors

Manuscripts in English, German or French should be submitted in duplicate (i.e. the original with one copy, and two sets of illustrations) to Acta Tropica, Swiss Tropical Institute, Socinstr. 57, CH-4051 Basel, Switzerland. They will be sent, as a rule, to two referees inside or outside the country. The decision to accept, revise, or refuse a paper will be made by the editors. The editors assume that papers submitted to Acta Tropica have not been and will not be published elsewhere.

The *manuscripts* should be typewritten double-spaced with a wide margin. Original papers should not exceed 12 printed pages including tables and figures (24 typewritten pages of 32 lines of 60 letters). Exceptionally, the editors may accept larger manuscripts, however, the author(s) may be charged for exceeding pages at a rate of approx. sFr. 100.- per page.

A short and precise *summary*, only in English, should precede the article and contain the essential information. For papers written in German or French the summary should be more detailed and must be preceded by the English translation of the title.

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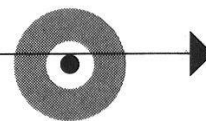
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
