Swiss National Society

Swiss National Society 1874-1974

I had the opportunity to study the first articles and minutes of our Society, notably a document written to the Swiss Federal Council and signed by all the founding members on November 9, 1874. On that memorable day for us, the Swiss National Society was born out of a common need for unity amongst the Swiss in the Montreal area and the establishment of a strong voice to be heard not only here but also in our native land.

This letter to the Swiss Federal Council asked for the establishment of a Swiss Consulate in Montreal, and Switzerland obliged the following year. It is interesting to note that Switzerland, while studying the application of our Society, had to seek advice from our Embassies in London and Washington. Obviously not too much was known in the whole of Europe about Montreal and our adopted land Canada.

Our Society was founded as a men's club and has remained as such to this day as far as our active membership is concerned. Its purpose has possibly changed over the years and today it is primarily a social club. In the year 1922 the ladies of our members decided that what was good for the goose was good for the gander (actually vice-versa) and they formed the Swiss Women's Club Edelweiss, dedicated to charitable work amongst the needy Swiss in our community. Similar work is performed by the Swiss Benevolent Fund, founded in 1921 in which many of our members are prominent.

A number of sports activities are sponsored by our Society, notably Bowling, Golf, Physical conditioning and Shooting. Our Bowling section organizes league play from September to late April. Annually also a match with Toronto is staged. This year, we had the pleasure of entertaining our friends from the Swiss Club Toronto. Our annual Golf Tournament in August has grown from a very modest beginning some years ago and draws now over one hundred participants.

The "shooters" formed many years ago the Alpine Rifle Club and restricted their activities to small bore shooting. Except for an annual "Schuetzenfest" the Club was sort of dormant for many years, however, became again very active in the past few years with the introduction of a shooting programme with Swiss Army Rifles and counts now about forty active members. Some individual scores are literally fantastic and

the Club average is the highest in the world amongst all Swiss Clubs participating.

PS: A "Gastronomic Week" in connection with Agricultur Exhibition is being arranged at some of the down-town hotels for the later part of the year, date and details to be announced.

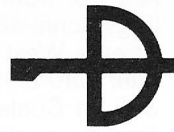

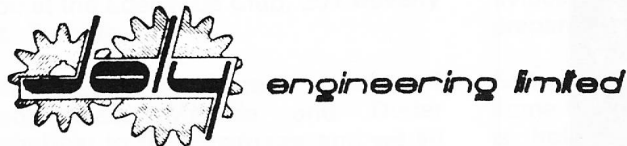

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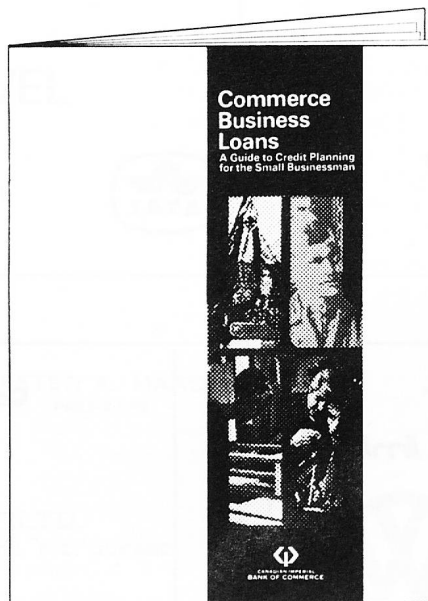

Création d'une "Amicale Romande" à Toronto

Itas diis placuit! Le 12 février 1974 restera pour les Romands de Toronto une date presque historique puisque c'est ce mardi soir que l'*Amicale Romande* vit le jour. Il faut dire d'emblée que "l'enfant" se présentait tout particulièrement bien, tant le désir des Romands de se regrouper devenait de plus en plus manifeste. Il n'y manquait, si l'on peut dire, que ce petit rien qui a le pouvoir de concrétiser une chose fort souhaitée. Grâce à une nouvelle initiative et aux efforts conjugués de M. Rudolf Neeser, Consul général de Suisse, de M. François Pillonel, Vice-Consul et d'une poignée de Romands, il a été possible de convoquer les chauds partisans du projet à une première réunion qui se tint, le 12 février 1974 précisément, au 33ème étage du Sutton Place Hotel.

Cinquante Romandes et Romands répondirent spontanément à l'invitation qui leur était faite de partager un repas en commun et de décider de la création de l'Amicale. Cette sympathique soirée débuta par les apéritifs offerts par notre Consul général; puis, dans la même ambiance de fête, l'on se répartit autour

de tables que garnissaient la Dôle et le Dézaley.

Les discussions allaient déjà bon train lorsque M. Otto Marbach, en sa qualité de Président du Swiss Club de Toronto, ouvrit la partie administrative de cette soirée. Après ses vœux de bienvenue, M. Marbach releva combien le Comité qu'il préside encourageait la création d'un groupe des Romands à Toronto; il s'engagea même à nous assurer du soutien inconditionnel du Swiss Club. Prenant la relève, notre Consul général sut, avec cette teinte d'humour de bon goût qui le caractérise, nous dire tout l'intérêt qu'il portait lui aussi à notre projet. M. Neeser se plut également à relever la présence romande au sein de son équipe de collaboratrices et collaborateurs. Il revint ensuite à M. Pillonel d'introduire l'ordre du jour proposé pour la circonstance. Après nous avoir donné connaissance d'une statistique des Romands établis dans la Province de l'Ontario, M. Les paroles de Mlle le Professeur Laure Rièse, Présidente de l'Association culturelle canadienne-suisse ont été aussi fort appréciées.

Le vote qui clôtura ce chapitre ne devrait plus réserver de surprise, tant les avis parlaient tous en sa faveur. Aussi est-ce à l'unanimité que la création du groupe des Romands fut acceptée. Il s'agissait ensuite de baptiser la nouvelle société. Après l'examen de diverses propositions, elle reçut en définitive le nom d'*Amicale Romande de Toronto*. Une Amicale encore "dans les langes" ne pouvant se guider par elle-même, nous passions sans plus tarder à l'élection d'un comité restreint. A l'unanimité encore, les voix se portèrent sur M. Raymond Caloz, Vice-Président de Panalpina World Transport Ltd., qui fut consacré premier Chairman de l'Amicale. Pour le second, l'assemblée fit appel à M. Henri Kaegi en qualité de Vice-Chairman. Le Secrétariat de l'Amicale sera assuré par la charmante Demoiselle Paule Ruffieux.

Les divers n'ayant pas donné lieu à des propositions spéciales, le nouveau Chairman clôtura la réunion. Il le fit en termes choisis et simples, conscient de la confiance que ses amis Romands venaient de placer en lui. Nul doute qu'entre ses mains l'Amicale Romande fera un long et fructueux chemin. One hundred years ago . . . From Saanen in the Canton of Berne to Nipissing

Some two hundred miles north of Toronto on the road to Burk's Falls, just outside Magnetawan, is an old farm field, shoulder-high in hay. Tucked back in a corner of the field, barely visible from the road, is an old post archway. It is closed with pagewire fencing. Inside the fence, wild fern has all but totally obscured a pioneer graveyard, a memorial to Swiss settlers who helped to open up the country south of Lake Nipissing. Most of the inscriptions on the gravestones are still readable. The names they bear leave no doubt as to the Bernese origin of those buried here: Raaflaub, Matti, Hauswirth, Haldi and Reinhard. Pioneers' Cemetery with its Western style archway is the last place of rest of these immigrants who came mostly from the Saanen area. How did it happen?

Largely responsible for this emigration was Baroness Elise von Koerber, a gentle lady of European origin living in Canada. With the backing of the Canadian authorities, she conducted a campaign from 1873 to 1878 in Europe, and particularly in Switzerland, to foster the emigration of farmers to the sparsely settled Nipissing region. Madame von Koerber distributed leaflets, held press conferences and organized information meetings for prospective emigrants.

An exploratory expedition headed by the distinguished world traveler and professor of mineralogy Jacques Kaderli of Berne (1827-1874), toured the Nipissing region in October and November 1873 on behalf of Madame von Koerber and the Canadian authorities. In his report 'Compte-Rendu de mon expédition sur les côtes sud-est du Lac Nipissing, au Nord de la province Ontario en Canada, octobre et novembre 1873', Kaderli gave useful information about soil, climate, harvesting prospects and also mentioned by name some of the few European farmers already there. Other members of the exploratory mission were Jakob Brunschweiler of St. Gall, Edouard Schmid of Basel and Edouard von Zuben of Alpnach, Canton of Obwald. Von Zuben was apparently the only one of this group to eventually settle in the Nipissing area.

Swiss authorities viewed Madame von Koerber's activities sympathetically, but refused to lend her any official support,

since regulations prevented them from showing preference for any specific emigration destination. Even an offer by the Canadian Government to defray all the expenses of sending to Nipissing a neutral observer, chosen by the Swiss authorities, was turned down.

Nevertheless, Baroness von Koerber pursued her campaign in Switzerland. She presided over numerous public meetings in Berne, Liestal and finally in Saanen, where she must have been quite persuasive, since some farmers from the Saanen area soon disposed of their goods and left for the Nipissing/Magnetawan area. The "Amtsblatt des Kantons Bern" (Official Gazette of the Canton of Berne) listed in its issue of March 20, 1875, the petition of five families from Saanen and nearby Gsteig, who wished to emigrate to Nipissing.

Some of the early Swiss settlers received Crown Lands near Hungry Lake (now Carmen Lake, Chapman Township) and later—because of the poor, rocky land first granted to them—moved to nearby Magnetawan, Nipissing and Croft Townships. Between 1873 and 1890 approximately one hundred Swiss came directly from their native country to settle in the area just southeast of Lake Nipissing. By opening up the land, often under severe conditions, they contributed largely to the development of the Nipissing region.

On December 31, 1882, some of the settlers decided to establish a protestant church in Magnetawan. The co-signers of the declaration prepared to this effect were mostly Swiss. In addition to those already mentioned, the early church registers list many Swiss names such as Aellen, Boo, Bossert, Brand, Courvoisier, Eidam, Gerber, Gutjahr, Grünig, Kernen, Knoepfli, Meier, Noll, Salzmann, Uelliger and Würsten.

Ties with the motherland remained strong. The only subscriber in Nipissing of a Saanen weekly caused much joy by regularly circulating his newspaper among the immigrants.

Today, many descendants of the Swiss pioneers still live in the area opened up by their ancestors one hundred years ago; they are successful farmers or businessmen.

The Government of Ontario is also interested in the history of the settlers who came from Switzerland. It plans to erect in the near future a historical plaque to honor the early Swiss immigrants and their contribution to the development of the Nipissing region.

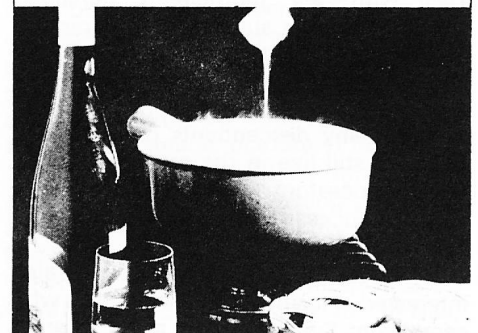
