



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#### BANK SAVINGS IN SWITZERLAND


According to the latest statistics issued by the Swiss National Bank, savings deposits in 1973 were once again the biggest item of bank savings in Switzerland. Even so, the figures for 1973 show the beginning of an evolution that represents a serious problem today: traditional bank saving — in the form of savings deposits, savings accounts and savings books and bonds — is tending to stagnate and the rates of growth of the different forms of saving are falling off or even, in some cases, negative. At the end of 1973, savings deposits totalled 53.9 billion francs (end of 1972: 48.6 billion), which corresponds to 58.7% of traditional bank savings as a whole. The rate of increase amounted therefore to 10.9% as compared with 17.7% for the previous year. For savings books, the increase was only 3.5% (1972: plus 28.2%) and for bonds, the volume even decreased by 1.7%, whereas in 1972 there was an increase of 6.3%. The 53.9 billion francs in savings deposits is held in 10.2 million separate accounts, the average saving per account being 5,284 francs. Some 7.5 million of these accounts (73.5% of the total) and an average saving of less than 5,000 francs, 1.2 million a saving of 5,000 to 10,000 francs. (SODT)

## MAIN CAUSES IN THE RISE OF THE COST OF LIVING IN SWITZERLAND IN 1974

Among the main items of expenditure listed in the Swiss consumer price index is food, which showed the most marked rise in 1974. It accounts for nearly one third of the mean general annual rise in the index, while a little less than one sixth only is accounted for by rents, and one eighth by each of the clothing and heating-lighting groups. Transport's share in the rise in the cost of living amounted to 10%, while that of the groups "health and personal care," "home furnishings and upkeep," "beverages and tobaccos" as well as "education and entertainment," varied between one fifteenth and one thirty-fifth. The average rate of rise in the cost of living in 1974 amounted to 9.8%. It can be broken down as follows: food: 3.1%; rents: 1.5%; clothing: 1.2%; heating and lighting: 1.2%; transport: 1.0%; health and personal care: 0.6%; home furnishings and upkeep: 0.5%; beverages and tobaccos: 0.4%; education and entertainment: 0.3%.
