COMMUNICATION FROM THE EMBASSY

Adoption of Foreign Children by Swiss Citizens

According to the Federal Amendment to the Swiss Civil Code (Adoption and Article 321) of 30th June, 1972, Swiss citizens who have adopted foreign children can claim Swiss citizenship for such children.

Adoptive parents intending to make use of this opportunity are asked to get in touch, as soon as possible, with the Embassy of Switzerland, P.O. Box 386, Wellington. Adoptions which have taken place before the coming into effect of the Amendment

(30.6.1972) should be announced to the Embassy by not later than 30th June, 1977.

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OBITUARY

The death occurred of Conrad Arnold Biland on Saturday morning 25th September at his home in Te Rapa. Arnold arrived in New Zealand in 1927, had a period of farming in Cambridge before he purchased the present property in 1936.

Arnold Biland is the one which the Swiss Community of Hamilton will long remember, because he was the principal founder and first President which he held for ten years. During this time he guided the Club through periods when it was thought to be desirable to purchase a property or Clubhouse and many such projects were contemplated and not considered favourable enough in the Club's interest.

All through this period he was chief editor of the *Helvetia* until the A.G.M. of this year when he retired. He brought this paper up from a 4-page leaflet 20 years ago to the present 24-page booklet. His motto was "do it right or not at all."

The Rev. Canon Pierard in his ecology in the Cathedral Church of St. Peter compared Arnold with the hero of Sempach, Arnold von Winkelried, who grabbed two arms full of spears and thus breached a hole in the defence of the foe. He was a man of simple pleasures and great personal endeavours as a family man. In his occupation as an overseer with the Ministry of Works he was most impressed by efficiency in business as well as in personal matters.

As a lieutenant in the Swiss Army before he came to this country, he developed a love and admiration for all good things that Switzerland stood for. When he was home on leave some five years ago he made a moving 1 August speech in the Emmenthal which was reported on as the Speech of a Compatriot by some Swiss newspapers.

At the last A.G.M. in Auckland, although one could see that his health was failing him, he still retained the delegate of the Auslandschweizer Kommission, of which he was the only Swiss from this country, in the hope that his health may improve and he could go there and fight for the voting rights of Swiss Abroad, which he thought all Swiss should have by right, and which was one of his prime objectives.

Now we have to say good bye to a friend of long standing and we can only pass our sympathies to Mrs Hedy Biland, Dr. Alex Biland and family and Mr Peter Biland and family.

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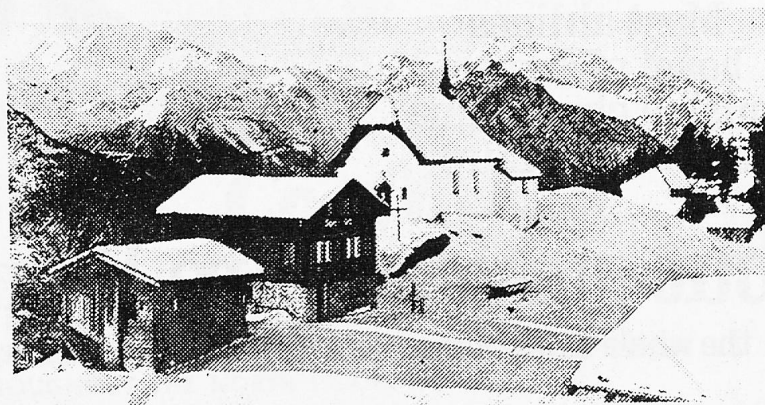
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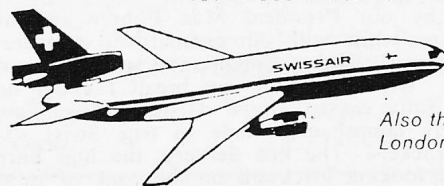

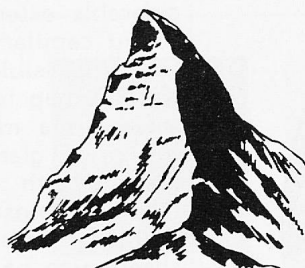
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AUCKLAND SWISS CLUB 20-YEAR JUBILEE BALL

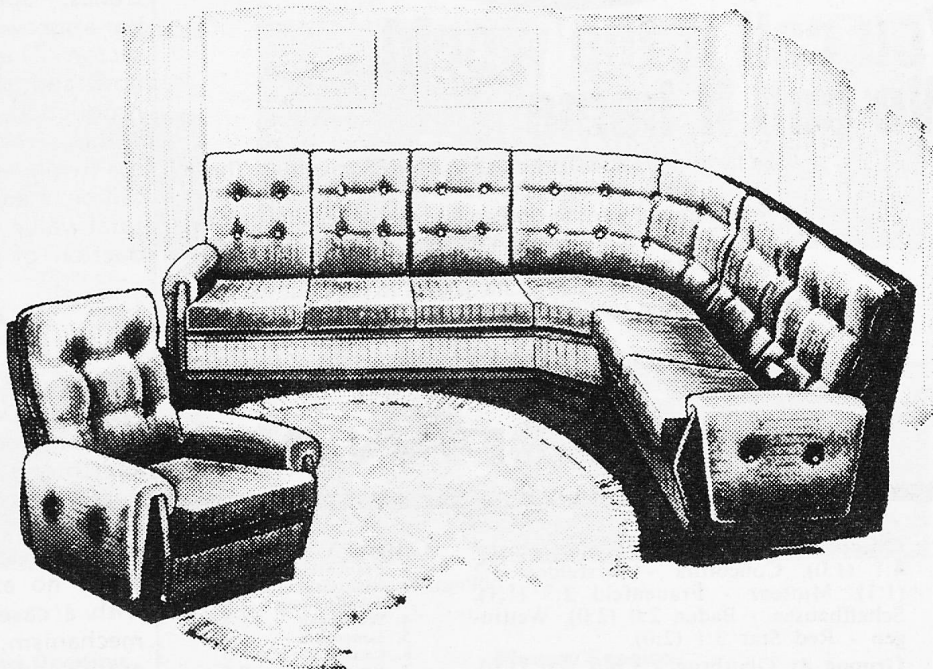

BILLIONS INVESTED IN THE ELECTRICAL INDUSTRY

In Switzerland, nearly 22 billion francs has been invested so far in electricity production and supply. The annual expenditure on the construction of electrical power stations, transmission and distribution plant reached a record level of 1965, with a sum in excess of 1.2 billion francs. On the other hand, if the average over the last five years is worked out, the annual figure remains less than 1 billion francs. Specialised circles consider that there will be a growing need for capital in this investment sector. The total value of the sums invested between now and the end of the century on plant for the production, transport and distribution of electricity—without making allowances for any rise in the cost of living — could amount to something like 50 billion francs, i.e. almost two and a half times the total value of all investments made since the introduction of electricity into this country. It consists of an 180g spray bomb, containing a simple or insecticide deodorant and offering the advantage of requiring no shaking or stirring before use. Depending on the size of the premises to be deodorised or the strength of the smells to be removed, the quantity of product to be sprayed each time can be adjusted by means of a regulator screw. This automatic appliance is therefore extremely economical and will work over 4,000 times before requiring a refill. (SODT)
