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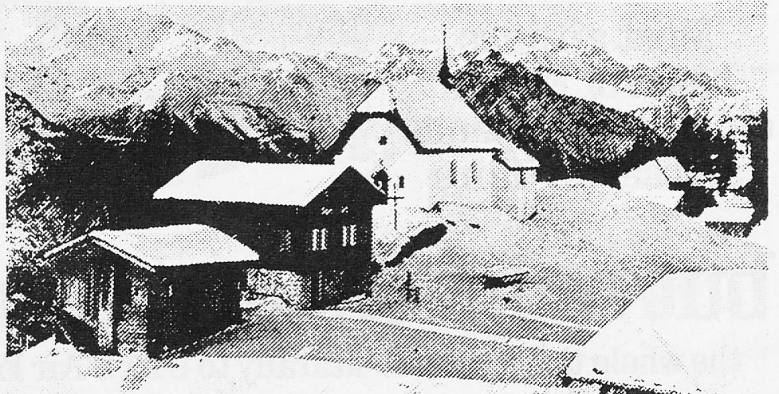
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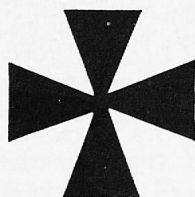
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sandwiches, hot dogs and cakes, and handed out dozens (or hundreds?) of bottles filled with all kinds of contents.

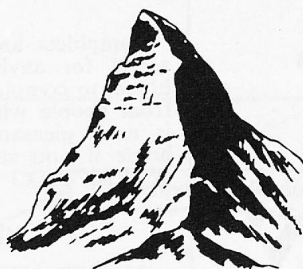

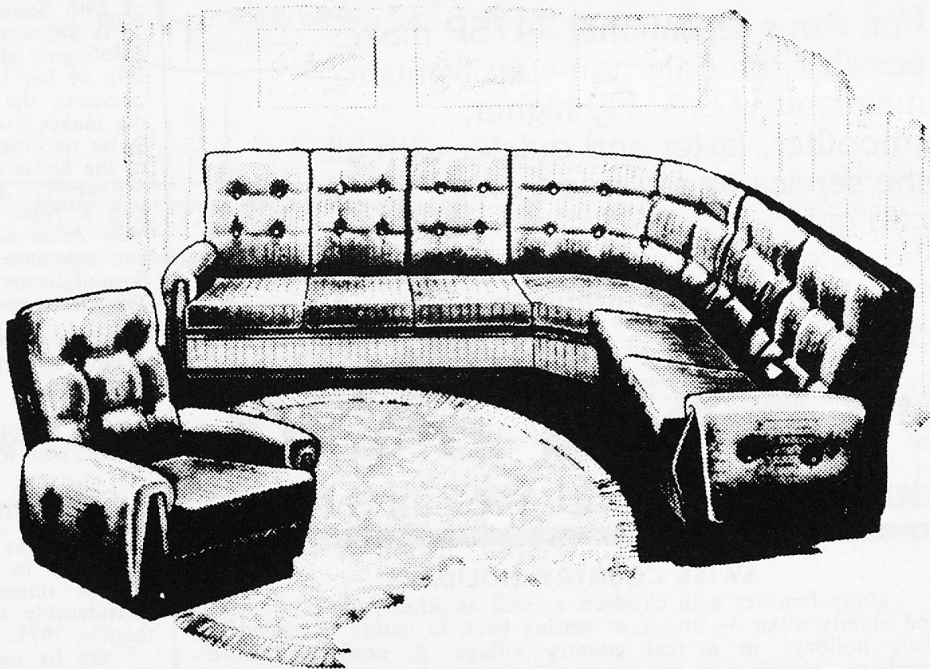

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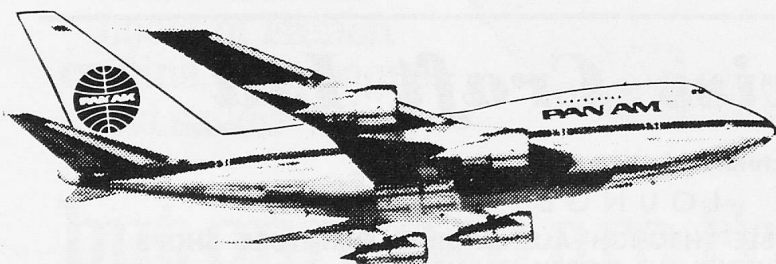
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SWISS COUNTRY HOLIDAYS

Many families with children, as well as other people — young and elderly alike — dream of getting back to nature by spending their holidays in a real country village. A newly-established brochure "Holidays in the Country", shows where this dream can come true in French-speaking Western Switzerland and the Italian-speaking canton of Ticino. It lists about 50 holiday apartments in which visitors can prepare their own meals (buying fresh food supplies from local farmers), as well as the addresses of private rooms in farmhouses, with breakfast, full board or half board. The brochure also describes local sports facilities. It is obtainable from the Service romand de vulgarisation agricole, Pavement 81, CH-1018 Lausanne.

SWISS HOTELS WITH SWIMMING POOLS

The Swiss National Tourist Office (SNTU) has published a new edition of its brochure listing hotels which have their own swimming pools. It shows that 83 Swiss resorts and towns have no fewer than 380 hotel swimming pools between them. The list gives details of the type of pool (indoor or open-air), size, water temperature, opening times, saunas, massage and keep-fit facilities and whether use is restricted to hotel guests.

"HOME" FOR SWISS LIVING ABROAD AT DURRENÄSCH, AARGAU

Pamphlets and literature have just arrived from Durrenäsch, for anybody who wishes to stay as a guest at the home, to complete and send to Switzerland. From all accounts from people who stayed there as guests, the accommodation is most pleasant and well organised. It makes you feel at home if you stay at the "home." Literature available from W. Loss of Swiss Nationality:

We would like to draw attention — especially to parents and unmarried Swiss women — to Article 9 of the Federal Law about the Acquisition and Loss of the Swiss Nationality of 29th September, 1952, which states (freely translated):

"A Swiss woman loses her Swiss nationality when marrying a foreigner if, through the marriage she acquires the citizenship of her husband or if, at the time of the marriage, she possesses the same already, unless, **prior to the marriage**, she makes a declaration stating that she wishes to retain her Swiss nationality. The declaration must be made in writing to the Swiss representation." (Embassy).

Example: A Swiss woman born in New Zealand, who is also a New Zealand citizen by birth, and who marries a New Zealander, loses her Swiss Nationality, unless, prior to her marriage, she signs the abovementioned declaration. Special forms for this purpose are available at the Embassy. The declaration is free of charge.

Change of Address:

This opportunity is taken also to remind all Swiss registered with the Embassy, that they should advise the Embassy of any change of address. If done so without delay, a lot of time-consuming research work will be avoided. Thank you for your co-operation.

SWISSAIR'S 1976 TRAFFIC RESULTS

1976 was a very satisfactory year for Swissair: for the first time in its 46-year history it carried more than six million stage-passengers. The volume of traffic exceeded considerably the target, but the level of revenue was lower than in 1975.

On its network which has an unduplicated total length of 248,492 kilometres and includes 87 cities in 61 countries, Swissair last year supplied 2.1 billion ton-kms or 6.5 p.c. more than in the previous year. The number of revenue tkm advanced 12.2 p.c. to 1.1 billion. On a total of 69,456 flights, Swissair transported an aggregate total of 6,125,456 passengers representing an increase of 13 per cent over 1975. Cargo shipments gained 12 p.c., and mail carryings were up 10 p.c. The seat load factor climbed from 55 to 59 p.c. The overall load average improved from 52 p.c. to 54 p.c.

Passenger traffic registered a lively growth rate notably Middle and Far East. A marked passenger downturn on the operations across the North Atlantic and to the South Atlantic was mitigated by a considerable accretion in freight. Cargo shipments over the Far East Asian routes continued to grow at a rate exceeding the average.
