Communications from the Embassy in London

As most of the readers of the Swiss Review may already know, the BRITISH NATIONALITY ACT 1981 will come into force on January 1, 1983.

This Act is from a Swiss view point relevant in so far that a child born to Swiss parents in this country will no longer become automatically a dual national. If both parents are Swiss and live in the U.K. only temporarily, i.e. as students or temporary workers, the newly born child will be of course Swiss but not British.

If either the child's father or mother is British and the other Swiss, according to the new Act the child becomes British; according to the Swiss Nationality Law the child becomes at birth Swiss if the father is Swiss. If the mother is Swiss and married to a foreigner, the child becomes only Swiss, if both parents, although living temporarily in the U.K., have at the time of birth their domicile in Switzerland.

A child born to Swiss parents permanently settled in the U.K. will become automatically dual national. (A person is settled if he/she is lawfully in Great Britain, ordinarily resident and not subject to a time limit on his/her stay). It may be appropriate to remind here Article 10 of the SWISS Nationality Law, which states:

"a person, born abroad and having both Swiss and foreign citizenship, whose father was also born abroad, *loses* Swiss citizenship upon attaining age 22, unless his/her birth has been duly registered with a Swiss authority in Switzerland or abroad before that date".

The following schedule may help you to understand the consequences of the new British Nationality Act:

The Home Office, where precise information on the British Nationality Act may be obtained, has stated the following: "As a consequence of the British Nationality Act 1981, which comes into force on 1 January 1983, children born in the United Kingdom after that date will not become British citizens unless at the time of birth one of the parents a British citizen or settled here. This means that, under the United Kingdom's immigration law, although a child born here to parents who are not citizens or settled here would not require permission to stay here, he would require permission to return to this country if he went abroad.

In order to overcome difficulties at ports if such a child seeks to be readmitted after an absence abroad, particularly if he is not accompanied by his parents, the Home Office is anxious that children born here should have their position regularised before they leave the U.K. Parents who themselves have a current permission to be here will be able to apply to the Home Office to do this.

The Home Office has prepared the following guidance leaflet to tell parents how to apply for leave for their children born in the United Kingdom on or after 1 January 1983.

Notice to parents from overseas who have children who were born in the United Kingdom on or after 1 January 1983

The Change made by the British Nationality Act 1981

The British Nationality Act 1981 came into force on 1.1.1983. Under the previous law any child born in the United Kingdom was automatically citizen of the United Kingdom and Colonies (except in some special cases). The effect of the 1981 Act is that a child born in the U.K. on or after 1.1.1983 will *not necessarily* be a citizen.

Applying for your child to be given leave to stay in the United Kingdom

You can apply now to the Home Office, at the address given at the end of this leaflet, for your child to be given permission to stay here. You do not have to do this, but if you are planning to stay in the United Kingdom for some time, and particularly if your child is likely to travel abroad and then come back here, you would be well advised to do so. If your child has permission to stay in the United Kingdom before he goes abroad, it means he can be readmitted more easily.

What permission to stay will my child be given?

Normally a child will be given permission to stay for as long as his parents have permission to be here. If he leaves the United Kingdom he may be given permission to re-enter, provided he is coming back with, or to join his parents and they have permission to be here. If his parents do not have permission to be in the

Which children are British citizens

A child born in the United Kingdom will be a British citizen if one of his or her parents is a British citizen. It does not matter how the parent concerned became a British citizen or whether he or she is such a citizen by birth, adoption, descent, naturalisation or registration. If neither parent is a British citizen, the child will still be a British citizen if one of his or her parents is settled here. (A person is settled if he is lawfully here, ordinarily resident and not subject to a time limit on his stay). If neither of the child's parents is a British citizen and neither is settled in the United Kingdom then the child will not be a British citizen by birth.

Children who are not British Citizens

A child who is not a British citizen does not have the right of abode in the United Kingdom, and is subject to immigration control. He does not need permission to stay here. If he travels abroad, he will need permission to come back into the United Kingdom United Kingdom, either because they came unlawfully or have stayed longer than they were allowed, a child cannot normally be given leave to stay or to re-enter.

How to apply

If you think that your child may be subject to immigration control and wish to apply for him to be given permission to stay, or if you need further information, you should write to:—

This leaflet is only a general guide and has no legal authority as an interpretation of the 1981 Act and the Immigration Rules.
