READING OF MINUTES OF THE LAST A.G.M.

The minutes of the last A.G.M. were read by Mrs P. Rowe and found correct. This was moved by Mr J. Dettling and seconded by Mr J. Steiner. Carried. There were no matters arising from the minutes.

PRESIDENTS REPORT:

Read by Mr Dudli. Mr Dudli opened his report by mentioning the passing on of three members of the Society, namely Mr Walter Risi, Mr Joe Kaiser, and Mr Frank Reichmuth. He then asked for a moment silence as a mark of respect.

Mr Dudli then thanked the outgoing editing committee for all the work they had done involving the Helvetia and the riflemaster for his organisation and to his secretary for all the fine work she had done. The Society's financial position was very sound, and had not been called upon to give any financial aid to any member.

Mr Dudli welcomed the new charge d'Affaires Mr I. Etienne and hoped they enjoy their stay in New Zealand.

Mr Dudli then mentioned that himself and his wife had the privilege to attend the 60th Congress of the Swiss Abroad with 450 delegates in Sierre. As they were the only 2 from South East Asia, Mrs Dudli was asked to speak for the women in this region. Mr Dudli said that it was a great experience and said that if anyone had the opportunity, they should attend.

Mr E. Studer moved that the Presidents report be accepted and Mr Stucki seconded it.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Financial report was read by Mrs P. Rowe. It was moved by Mr J. Dettling and seconded by Mr L.

SETTING OF SUBSCRIPTIONS

Mr Dudli suggested that the subs stay at \$7.00, and as the committee has the authority to review the subs in February this would be left until then. Mr Dudli then asked for a discussion on this and all present were in favour of leaving the subs at \$7.00. **HELVETIA REPORT**

This report was read by Mr E. Studer. 7 small Helvetia issues and 4 big Berne issues had been printed and sent in 1982/1983 year. Mr Dudli thanked everyone for coming and wished them good health and a safe journey home. He thanked the Taranaki Swiss Club for hosting the meeting.

As there was no further business Mr Dudli declared the meeting closed at 2.00 p.m.

EPILOGUE

In the night of 23rd - 24th May, Frank Reichmuth, our Life Member, died after a short illness in Green Lane Hospital. Frank was well known to us all as an honest working, genuine Swiss, and a true member of our Club.

He was born on the 23rd April, 1920 in Ibach, Switzerland, where he spent his childhood. After his apprenticeship as an A Grade mechanic, he served in the Swiss Army in Active service during the second World War.

In 1952, he, and his friend, Alois Holzgang, arrived in New Zealand. Unable to speak any English he began his first employment in a garage in Rangiriri, where he stayed for one and a half years as a motor mechanic. The next 18 months he spent with his friend in the bush in Ti Hoi as a bushman, and later he was actively employed as a diesel specialist by Cable Price. His last position was with the Electric Power Board where he stayed for twenty years until his retirement two years ago. As a motor mechanic and work-mate he was held in high esteem. In 1962 Frank bought a farm in Chamberlain Road, and through hard work this became his paradise. With great love he cared for his fruit and animals and he was happy there.

Frank was a foundation member of the Auckland Swiss Club, and as a humble helpful member he worked enumerable hours for the Club, on the Committee "Farm Trustee", in shooting, and in Club evenings etc. Frank was always standing by, — one did not have to ask him twice to get his help, — he was a genuine Swiss. He has left an irreplaceable hole in our ranks, a good man has been taken from us. Much more could be written about him, but we hold fond memories of the gentle-man he was. Life member, Frank Reichmuth, is no longer with us, but his willingness and outlook on life should be an inspiration to all of us for the future of the Auckland Swiss Club. Goodbye Frank.

His last resting place is the Swanson Cemetary.

EMPLOYMENT AND LABOUR MARKET IN SWITZERLAND IN 1982

After making allowances for seasonal variations, **employment** in Switzerland in 1982 ceased to drop from one quarter to the next. In the fourth quarter, the number of persons gainfully employed was 1.4% less than the figure for the last three months in 1981, which corresponds to the reduction of about 33,000 jobs. The number of workers in industry dropped by 4.4%, while in the building and services sectors it increased slightly.

Owing, in particular, to seasonal variations, unemployment increased in the fourth quarter and at the beginning of 1983. The **unemployment rate**, which amounted to 0.9% in the month of January, nevertheless remained very small compared with the figures in other countries.

In 1982, the part of the reduction in employment exceeding, the increase in unemployment was offset largely by a drop in the Swiss working population. The foreign working population, on the other hand, continued to increase; in December, it amounted to some 648,000 people, representing an increase of 1.7% compared with the same month in 1981. There are two reasons for this trend in the size of the foreign working population, which is the reverse of what occurred during the 1974-1976 recession: the worsening of the economic situation has had a far less marked effect than in the midseventies on certain branches such as the hotel trade and part of the building sector, in which foreign workers are particularly numerous. addition, holders of residence permits, who enjoy the same rights as Swiss citizens on the labour market, rose from 31% to 53% of the foreign working population between 1973 and 1982.
