The Society collects membership fees, co-ordinates the entertainment program, organizes several dances, the National Day Celebra-

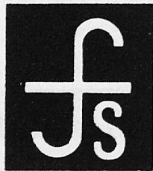

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At last!

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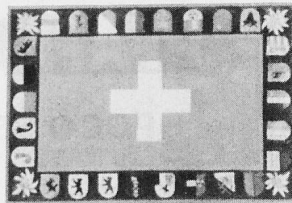
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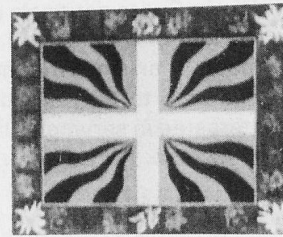
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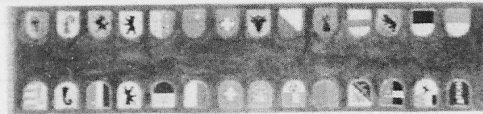
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The shooting facility in Bad Homburg is located in a beautiful sport Centre comprising athletic and soccer fields, equestrian centre, minigolf, tennis. The shooting facility has a 10 m indoor range and a combination 30 m, 50 m range. For the World Championship a special 30 m range was built.

Regulations are a big part of this level of competition and in order that no one gains an advantage, all equipment is inspected and marked. It was rather funny to see one of the German competitors having to rip part of his shoe support off (he still won the gold medal in standing) or one of our shooters remove the extra row of buttons on his shooting jacket. Rules are rules.

After all delegations arrived, 14 nations were present, an official opening ceremony marked the beginning of the World Championship. This was a well organized event, with marching bands, ma-

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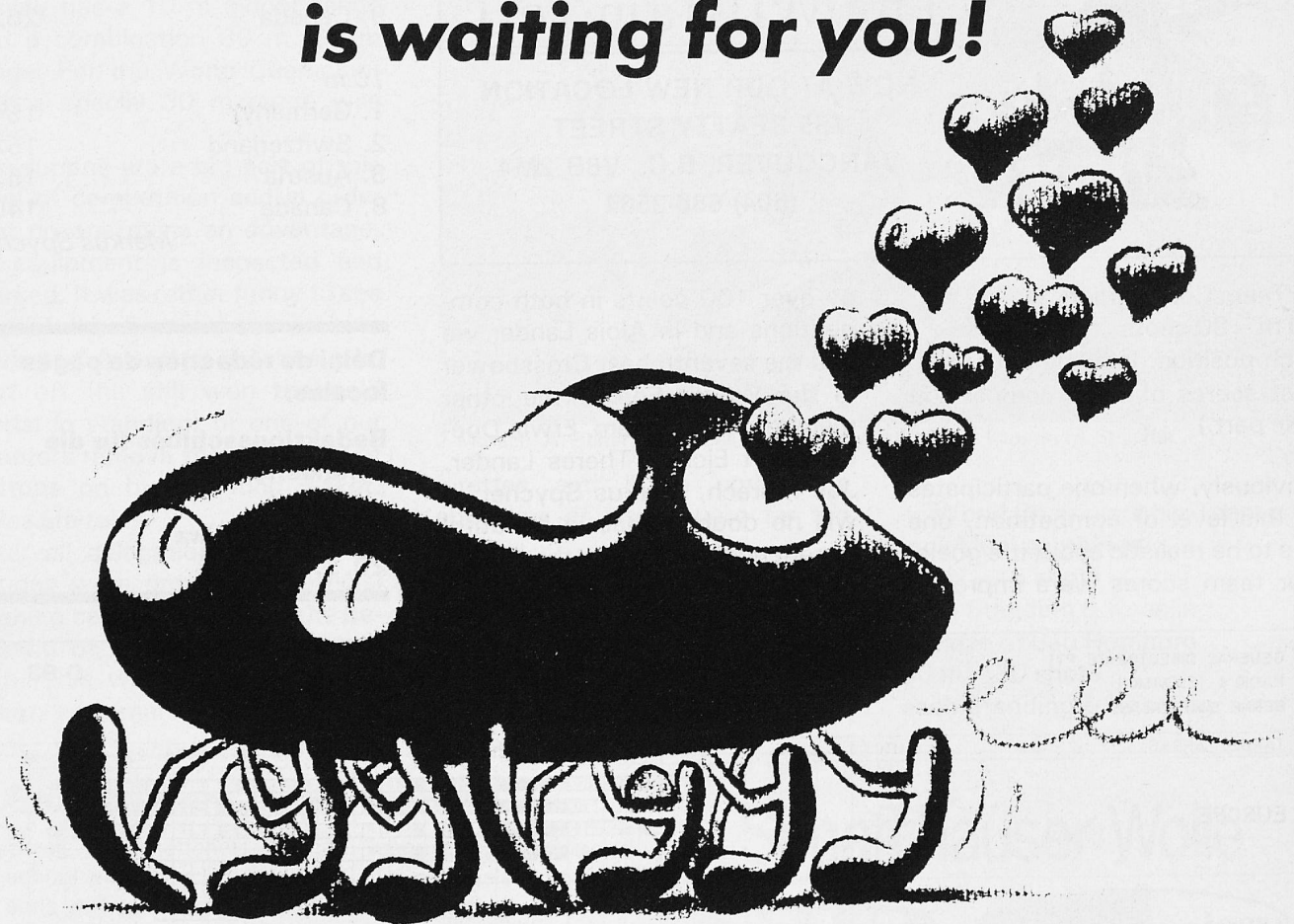
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
