
Youth: the call of the wild!

Spending unforgettable holidays in another country, getting to know a new language and a different culture, making friends for life: aren't you tempted? The exchange programme organised by the Secretariat for the Swiss Abroad makes it possible. And young people like it.

ow do Swiss young people spend their free time? Do they just sit around listening to country music? Do they really feed on nothing but cheese fondue and raclette? Of course not. But what do they do? How do the Swiss live? If you want to know, the rest is easy: since 1990 the Secretariat for the Swiss Abroad in Berne, working with the biggest worldwide youth exchange organisation, AFS Intercultural Programme, has been running an exchange scheme between young Swiss nationals in Switzerland and those abroad. This means: you spend your summer holiday with a host family in Switzerland and, either at the same time or afterwards, your family gives a holiday to a member of your host family here.

Favourable echoes


