World Solar Championship 1993

Since winning the World Solar Championship in 1990, held in Australia, the solar and light-electromobil-technology of Switzerland is leading worldwide.

In November the team of the Engineering School of Biel will defend its pool position in the solar race between Darwin and Adelaide.

Even though the Chief Engineer René Jeanneret characterises the improvements made since 1990 as small steps, the "Spirit of Biel/Bienne III" is secretly kept under cover.

Besides the application of more efficient solar cells and the development of a special scooter wheel for the "Spirit of Biel/Bienne III", important changes were made in regards to its weight and aerodynamic.

The main sponsor SMH (Swatch), who keeps certain rights on the vehicles' technique, shares the estimated costs of 3 million Swiss francs with several participants on government level.

The goal of the government contribution is to make sure that the technical progress of the "Spirit" goes along with the environmental education of the mobil society.

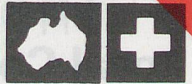

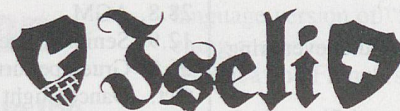

A Swiss woman's life in Australia

Two apple trees in a meadow, a zeppelin going past the window, tobogganing down a hill on a windy night, and a broken bottle of schnapps. These are the few memories a proud woman has of her childhood in Switzerland.

Elsy Baguley was born in St Gallen, Switzerland, but has spent most of her life in Australia. Growing up her family life was decidedly European, but 65 years after leaving Switzerland, how much has she really left behind?

Elsy was born on 14th June, 1920 to Karl Baumgartner and Elsa (nee Schlaepfer). In 1926 her family migrated to Australia, leaving behind friends and relatives but taking with them their culture and values.

Although Elsy only has a few memories of Switzerland she has not forgotten her Swiss roots. "I'm still proud of that heritage, it's part of your life. I've always felt Swiss."

Her home by the beach, about three hours from Sydney, holds many memories of the past. A St Gallen canton leadlight insignia hangs by the window, a tenuous link with her birthplace. The cuckoo clock on the wall carried all the way from Switzerland, a constant reminder of what she has left behind, and yet is still very much a part of. Family photos cover the walls, including two very austere looking pictures of her grandfather and grandmother. A traditional Swiss trinket box with keepsakes from all over Switzerland hangs on the living room wall, another testament to her identity.

Although Elsy has absorbed so much of the Australian culture, she retains many of the traditional Swiss ways that will always be a part of her strong personality. When asked what is the "most Swiss" part of Elsy, her younger brother Paul smiles wryly. He replies, "Her cooking. She makes a great rosti. And her potato salad is just like Muttie made it. It has vinegar and oil, no mayonnaise like a Australian potato salad."

Elsy's three sons, Peter, Paul and Ronnie, although very much aware of their mother's heritage, were not brought up in a typically Swiss environment, but Australian. It is easy to see just how entrenched Elsy is in her Australian lifestyle through her sons.

The few remaining memories of Switzerland seem to capture the essence of Elsy's identity. She does not remember the bigger picture and the tangible elements, but holds onto the little details and the fleeting moments. "I don't remember much of where I was born or St Gallen itself. All I remember is two apple trees down in the paddock there. I had to go and get my needles and it was up in one of those old places, and after I had had it, we were coming down the stairs, I looked out and there was this big zeppelin, going past the window. It was really low. I'll always remember that, it's one of my most vivid childhood memories. I can also remember tobogganing down that hill on a windy night with Papa coming home." Similarly, she doesn't at first appear to be typically Swiss, but she carries the little habits and details of her native country, just like her memories.
