# To facilitate mobility

**No stop to subsidies for Swiss schools in Europe, careful reform instead of dismantlement of the optional AHV/IV. Alongside these demands, the Council for the Swiss Abroad, at its spring session, also declared itself in favour of a quick agreement between Switzerland and the European Union.**

The Swiss Abroad attribute a central role to the worldwide presence of our country, Jean-Jacques Cevey, president of the Organisation for the Swiss abroad (OSA), told the Council. It would therefore go right against the grain to cease supporting Swiss schools abroad, which are an important corner-stone of our presence abroad, as well as to deprive Swiss Abroad

ment between Switzerland and the European Union, particularly in the field of free movement of persons. For many Swiss who already live in EU countries or who may wish to do so in future, relaxation in this field would help matters greatly.

The president reminded those present that a majority of members of the 1992 Congress of the Swiss Abroad

and not a threat for our country.

## New Swiss associations

Throughout the world there are now more than 700 Swiss associations and other institutions recognised by the Organisation for the Swiss Abroad. The Council was again able to welcome new foreign groups. In addition, it decided to maintain the entry criteria for associations, while introducing a new category of 'Associated Group'. This means that associations may now be welcomed if they fulfil only part of these criteria but at the same time take an active part in the way desired by the OSA.

It is true that the Federal Council, said Cevey, has rejected a new proposal by the Federal Social Insurance Office on reform of the optional AHV/IV, but the OSA will still be facing tough decisions on the two subjects of training and social security.

## Free movement of persons

Referring to the bilateral negotiations, at present blocked by the problem of surface travel, Cevey emphasised the importance of a quick agree-
