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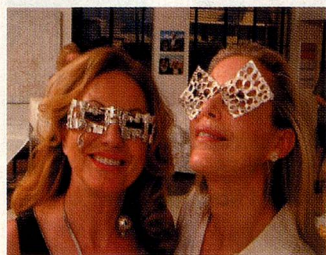

It lasted from November 30th to December 5th 2004, coinciding with the famous Art Basel Miami Beach.

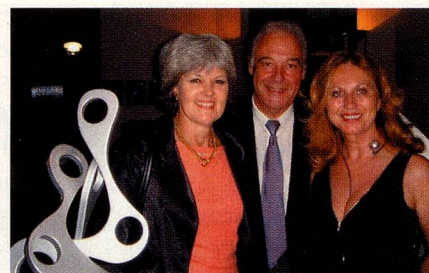
Kinetic sculpture by Ralf Gschwend

Fine Wooden Mosaics - The Journey of Mr. Blacksmith

"I played the violin as a child. I come from a very musical family. We were eight children and everybody played an instrument"

Born in Switzerland in the Kanton of Solothurn, Chris Blacksmith moved on with his interest in instrument to a Mecca for violins: When he was 16, he became a student at a violin-making school in Mittenwald in German Bavaria, where building violins has been a tradition for over three hundred years. "There I was trained to develop specific skills and an eye for art, for shapes and forms." He then moved to Vienna and worked as a violinmaker for the Vienna Philharmonic orchestra.

Today Mr. Blacksmith lives and works in Allenspark Colorado, a small mountain community near Boulder and the Rocky Mountain National Park. He makes fine wood mosaics that are used as tabletops, for wall hangings and as floor inlays. The first thing you think when

you see his works – he has a website: www.wooden-mosaics.com – is just how much work has to go into his finished products. The mosaics are reminiscent of the old European tradition of inlays in floors, of fine marble inlays in the Florentine style and of the mathematically precise works of M.C. Escher. They turn a flat space into a three-dimensional illusion. Asked about who his clients are, Mr. Blacksmith says that his business relies on "word of mouth". "They are friends or friends of friends. Some projects take an entire year or more to do. I cannot make a living off the mosaics. So I also build doors and do furniture repairs."

The path from Vienna to Allenspark was not a straight one. "In Mittenwald, there was a fellow from Nebraska. So I came to

Nebraska in 1973. Then I moved to Wichita, Kansas and worked in a violin repair shop. I became involved in all kinds of other ventures, such as hybrid corn research and general farming. I like nature." Through a friend, Mr. Blacksmith became involved with airlines and worked as a pilot scheduler. From there he found his way to mosaics. "I was quite poor. I had this four by eight plywood table and one day I started to draw designs on it. That is how the whole mosaic thing got started." One of his pilot friends lived in Colorado, so when Mr. Blacksmith became tired of moving around, he settled there.

Mr. Blacksmith has family in Switzerland and travels back occasionally. Asked about his roots and skills he says that one's family background, how you grow up and your environment makes people what they are. He appreciates his education in Mittenwald and the sense for precision he developed in Switzerland and Germany. He made, however, some concessions to his new homeland, learning the language and changing his name from Zurschmiede. "I wanted to adapt to my new home, and out of courtesy to my new environment".

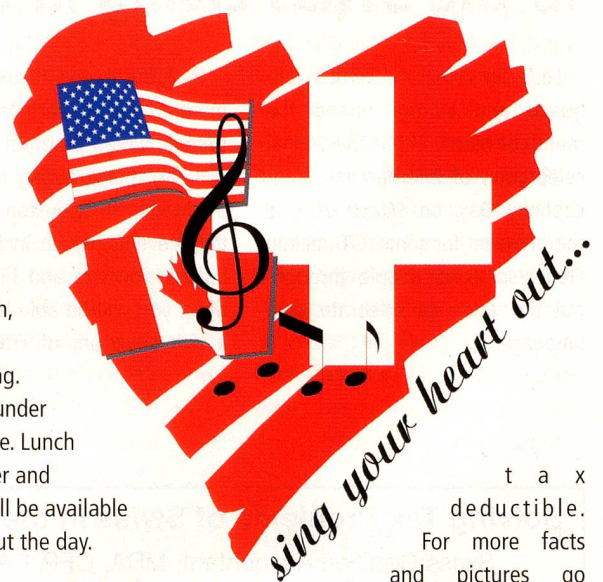

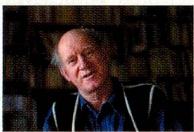

What had started out as the Swiss Peaks Festival in February 2003 has been transformed into a series called Swiss Peaks '04 and on our doorsteps now the follow up Swiss Peaks '05.

Over 35 events were co-organized by the team of Swiss Peaks '04 with more than 30 local

As a member of the Swiss Peaks team and a Swiss citizen living in New York I would like to open this retrospective with a little personal remark: I believe, that you have to leave your country to fully understand and appreciate it. Working on such a variety of projects was a great pleasure for me. I have met many interesting people from all walks of life with very different backgrounds, experiences and stories, and the common base was our relation to Switzerland. It has opened my horizon enormously and at the same time brought me closer to my Swiss roots. Swiss Peaks started the promotion of Swiss culture offering the opportunity to experience the opera "Die Schwarze Spinne/The Black Widow" by composer Heinrich Sutermeister (the adapted story of writer Jeremias Gotthelf), listen to concerts of renowned musicians such as the composer and oboist Heinz Holliger, composer and saxophonist Daniel Schnyder, the Koch-Schütz-Studer Trio (chamber music) and the Tonhalle Orchestra Zurich. Furthermore, we were able to listen to the poems of author and poet Giovanni Orelli, the narration of author and bal-

mentary screenings by and with actor/director Dani Levy, actor/director Bruno Ganz, a documentary on the Max Birnbach story (refugee in Switzerland) and many others during the Swiss Film Festival honoring the Locarno Film Festival. Last but not least, a film on the renowned artist Dieter Roth was shown in combination with the retrospective exhibit at the Museum of Modern Art. On another note Swiss Peaks participated as an exhibitor at the Northeast Conference on the Teaching of Foreign Languages with 2,500 educators from 40 states and 10 foreign countries.

Swiss Peaks '04, a year of Swiss Business and Politics in Manhattan!

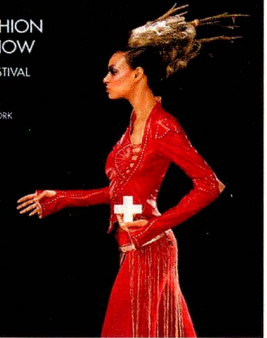

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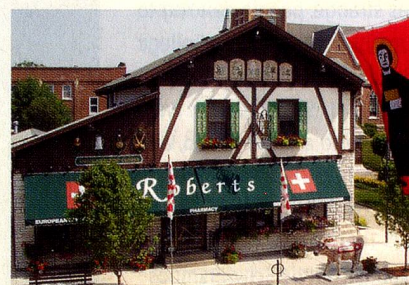
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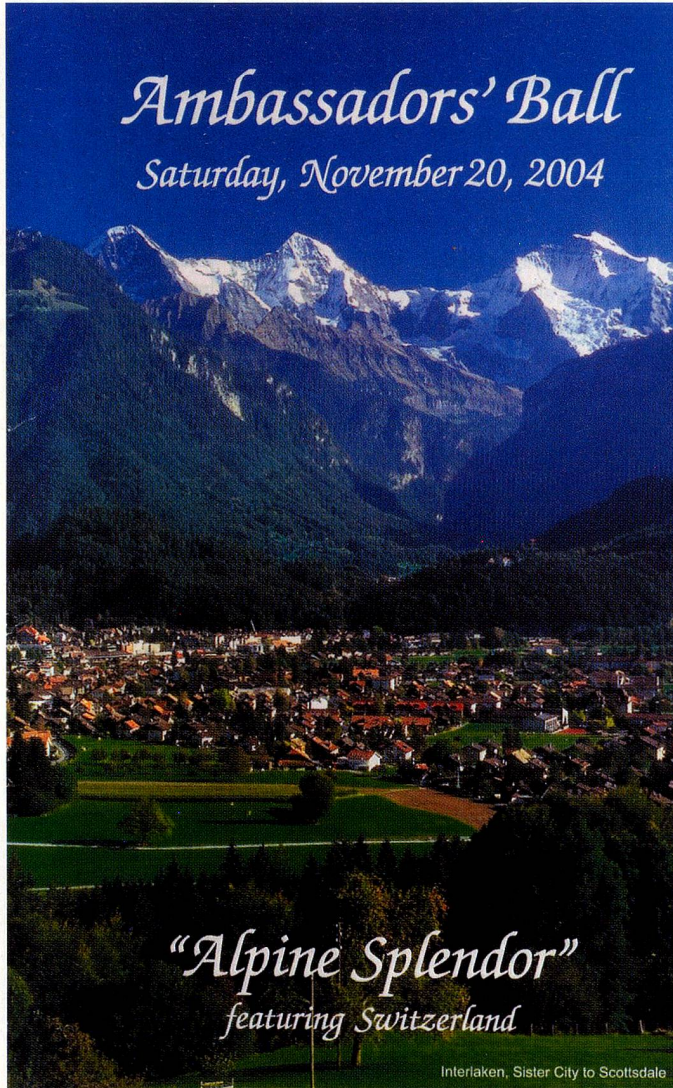

Ambassador's Ball in Scottsdale

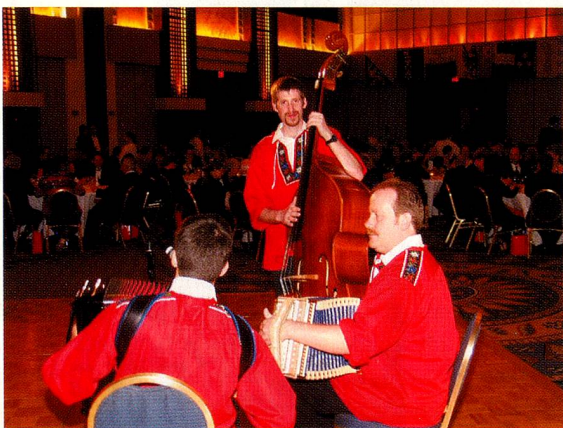

Was ist mit Amerika los?

Beobachtungen aus einem Land, das anders denkt.

"What's the matter with the US? – Observations from a country that thinks differently" is the loose translation of the title from the book written by Alfred Defago, former Consul General in New York and Ambassador of Switzerland in Washington and since 2001 Professor for International Relations at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, USA. So he should know what he is talking about! The 175

pages book contains several essays with titles like "The US and Europe: The end of a partnership", "Europe's conflicting America image", "An Empire that doesn't want to be one", "America's identity and the new Immigration", "Dilemma of a world power" and "Iraq and the consequences".

Professor Defago explains in a clear, precise and understandable language the reasons and motives that shaped the course of history

and influenced actions and reactions of America and Europe.

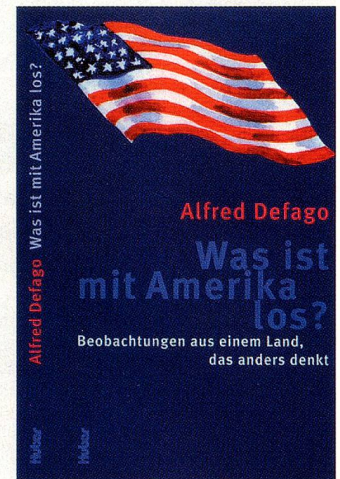

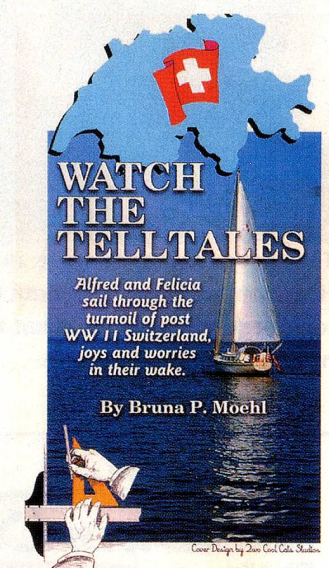

Dieter Meier - Film and Music Producer, Artist and Organic Rancher

Peripatetic pioneer Dieter Meier is at home on three continents. The son of a banker, he grew up in Zurich and studied law. He first drew attention to himself as an outstanding golf player and at 16 became member of the Swiss National Golf Team.

Artistically inclined, he directed short and feature films. His first feature "81'000 Units" was invited to the 1969 Cannes Film Festival. A music producer was interested in releasing Meier's first, rather eccentric record called "Cry for Fame". Since money was then not readily available to engage professionals to handle the sound system, he created his first pieces of music in a small home studio and termed his efforts amateurish.

Two years later, Meier met Boris Blank, a high priest in sound design, and together they founded the group YELLO. It revolutionized the music scene in Switzerland. The result was unbelievable success. Since 1979, YELLO has continuously released avant-garde electronic music and is considered the "Godfather of Techno" by music critics.

As a conceptual artist, Dieter Meier's work has been shown since 1971 in several museums (Kunsthau Luzern, New York Cultural Center, Documenta Kassel, Kunsthau Zurich and others). For his essays in the Neue Zuercher Zeitung Folio, he was awarded the Zurich Media Award, and for his music and video work he got the Art Award of Zurich in 1997.

In 1973, on a business trip to

Argentina with his father, Dieter Meier was deeply moved by the beauty and tranquility of its countryside. The vision to farm in Ar-

unspoiled vast pastures, totally cut off from traffic and noise.

For three months - termed by schedules - Meier lives in Zurich where he has established a wine store "Ojo de Agua" in the center of town. In his home in Hollywood, he keeps a state-of-the-art postproduction sound studio built by the local Swiss company Studio Bauton.

The studio also serves digital mixing consoles of Euphonix, a Silicon Valley company which Dieter Meier took over with a group of investors. Major Oscar winning films such as the "Lord of the Ring" and TV shows have been mixed on Euphonic con-

soles. A worldly entrepreneur, Dieter Meier continues his industrious agenda. He does not let himself be hurried. He develops an idea and works on it until he is satisfied with its merit.

gentina became a reality in 1996, when he got involved in organic farming and wine-producing.
