She uses vibrant strong colors as well as pastel and gold to give different aspect interpretations. "Nature itself symbolizes a world to retreat in, to seek peace and serenity," she said.

Zehnder Hahn has exhibited at shows in France, Germany and Switzerland as well as the United States and currently has work on display at "The Village" in New York City, Missouri and New Jersey.

She does not limit herself to artwork alone but has penned three children's books combining her art and text: "Zara and the Magical Slippers," "Hisham the Little Scorpion" and "Leila the Magical Spider."

"I love the cultural richness of San Marcos and the Texas Hill Country and would like to leave something behind to contribute culturally to society," she said, "my abstract artwork does not only landscape/nature but also many impressions of different cultures. Symbols do play a role

Then she enrolled in the Art program of the Sonoma State University and her world changed. With the nurture of fine art mentors, she discovered her talent and fell in love with the meditative approach to painting.

Her paintings are of abstract nature as she explores the tactile experience between perception and reality, capturing fractions of a thought like a snapshot in time by gifting it eternal life. She looks for interconnectedness of the soul and the universe and strives to describe the archetypal harmony in the universe, bringing its balance to life through her abstract paintings. Listening to this 38 year old artist, you are intrigued yet not surprised about her references to philosophy, metaphysics and a whiff of Buddhism. "To understand abstract art", Monika states, "requires the observer to immerse his/her soul." Her bubbles appear trapped under ice, someday to be freed like the



With their mission completed, the dogs' reward was a cool splash in a tub of water. Smiles from the audience reflected the instant pleasure these amazing animals were enjoying.

There was one competitor who stood out among the others, and he was a crowd favorite. Dr. med. vet. Alberto Stern from Lostallo, GR with his dogs Tweed

They startet their all home made house and cabins, Bavarian and Swiss Style, unearthing talents they had no idea slumbered within. Brigitte's Bavarian Bed and Breakfast was born. Letter to the Editor Tribute to Swiss Service in the U.S. Civil War (SR # 4/2009)

We much enjoyed your article on the American Civil War (called The War of Northern Aggression) in the South. The statement that verv few Swiss served in the Confederacy is of dubious ancestry, and your comment about Confederate Henry Wirtz was incomplete. Wirtz as commander of Andersonville attempted to repatriate Yankee POW's in exchange for Confederates scores of times because he lacked the food and supplies to properly attend to his duties as commandant. In fact, the history of the conflict demonstrates that the South tried to repatriate POW's at every level of government, only to be rebuked by Grant and Lincoln repeatedly. Wirtz was executed by the Yankees as you stated as a scapegoat, and his execution was unjustified and

has been regretted by Washington ever since.

Groundbreaking for Berne's Muensterberg Plaza and Clock Tower



Clock Tower Ground Breaking

Members of Berne's Muensterberg Plaza and Clock Tower steering committee broke ground Wednesday, March 17, 2010, to begin construction of the town's long-awaited clock tower project. Work will begin soon near the intersection of state Route 218 and U.S. 27 in Berne, with a dedication ceremony set for July 31, 2010, during this year's Swiss Days celebration. The clock tower will stand nearly 160 feet high and will include four large clock faces and animated fiberglass figurines that will emerge to perform a reenactment of scenes from the settlement of the city. The all volunteer steering committee has secured \$3 million dollars in private pledges to construct the clock tower and adjoining plaza.

This is a proposed Muensterberg Plaza design, created by Prince Alexander Partners Inc. of Indianapolis, the architect working with the Berne Community Development Corporation on the project. Special plaza features will include a gazebo, a promenade, a water feature and a settlers sculpture. In addition to being a tourist attraction, the clock tower and plaza will provide a focal point for community festivals and special events, with a stage area and sound equipment for concerts and community gatherings.
