Dear readers, dear compatriots,

■ The Congress of the Swiss Abroad and the assembly of the Council were

held in Montreux on 16-18 August. Oceania was well represented by two CSA delegates from Australia and two from New Zealand. The decision by the Federal Government to reverse its earlier plan of introducing electronic voting as a regular voting channel – spelling the end of e-voting for the near future – caused great disappointment and incomprehension among the delegates. It means there will be no e-voting option available for the upcoming federal elections in October. An interview with OSA



Federal elections 2019

The National Council elections and the first round of elections for the Council of States will take place on **20 October 2019**. A quarter, or 195,000 of the 775,000 Swiss Abroad are registered on an electoral roll and are entitled to elect their National Councillors, and also their members for the Council of States in the following 12 cantons BE, BL, BS, FR, GE, GR, JU, NE, SO, SZ, TI and ZH.

In Oceania less than 15%, or 4,800 of the 33,000 registered Swiss are on an electoral roll. Oceania lags behind the average quite significantly. It is up to us; an increased Swiss Abroad vote, and considering parties and candidates that are sympathetic to the Swiss Abroad, will increase our chances to be heard in Bern!

If you are a Swiss Abroad who is not registered on the voting and electoral roll you must complete a registration form to be able to participate in elections and voting in Switzerland. It can be downloaded here: https://tinyurl.com/yynx2452

The completed form must be submitted to either the Swiss Embassy of Switzerland in Wellington or to the Consulate General in Sydney, depending on where you are domiciled/registered. More information about voting and electoral rights can be found here: https://tinyurl.com/yxvgnalw

Switzerland elsewhere

A few months ago, I visited the exhibition 'Switzerland elsewhere' (Die Schweiz anderswo), which opened in April at the Forum Schweizer Geschichte in Schwyz (www.forumschwyz.ch) and will run until 29 September. The exhibition tells the history of emigration primarily through stories of individual women and men and with striking original objects. The exhibition layout resembles a labyrinth, each branch leads to a different biography or puts family histories and genealogical research in the foreground. It is designed to educate but also leaves



many questions purposely unanswered so to awaken curiosity. I had the privilege to meet the curator, Pia Schubiger, for a guided tour and I took the opportunity to ask her a few questions. Editor

Editor: Whose idea was it to create this exhibition?

Pia Schubiger: The input came from my side because I find the topic of the Swiss Abroad and their stories so incredibly fascinating. I thought that would be the perfect exhibition theme! With that idea I approached the exhibition planning committee of the Swiss National Museum which consist of the directors of the museum and a pool of curators which I am a member of. A range of proposals were discussed, and the decision to realise my idea was based on a number of criteria, such as the likely interest the topic would create.

What was the driving force to create this exhibition?

What drove me to create the exhibition "Switzerland elsewhere" was to give Swiss Abroad of today and those of the past a face, and to create a platform that enables the viewer to experience history through their biographies and stories. One is almost transposed into their lives and time, and I find this most interesting.

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How did you go about collecting the biographies, stories and objects?

Generally, it is not an easy task to collect objects simply because the emigrants took them with them, and only in rare cases did these objects find their way back to Switzerland. Some objects were loaned to us from other museums or were send to us from current Swiss Abroad. Furthermore, the 19th century, being the time frame during which most of the emigration occurred, is the century of the photography and that means we have a lot of historical photographs in our collection dating from the 1840s onwards. Apart from that, appropriate and supporting scenography, such as installations, graphics, maps and so forth also forms part of the exhibition. Once it was in the news that we wanted to realise this exhibition, it was amazing how many people came forward with interesting stories about family members that had emigrated, and some of them have indeed become part of the exhibition

Are you happy with the success of the exhibition, i.e. with the number of visitors?

Yes, we are very happy not only with the number of visitors but also with the responses we get from the public. Many have after visiting the exhibition approached us with their own stories or have actually come to see the exhibition because they have an emigrant story in their own family and would like to know more about genealogical research. We also have school classes visiting to learn more about immigration history. There are various supporting events were visitors can learn more about immigration and family research. So yes, I think we have achieved what we have set out to do.

Would you be interested in taking on other project on the topic of emigration and the Swiss Abroad?

The topic is huge and an incredible fascinating one, and maybe in the future I might revisit it if the opportunity arises. For now, however, it will continue in as much as I have invited the 'Office of Immigration History' (Musée Imaginaire des Migrations, https://www.mimsuisse.ch) to record stories of Swiss Abroad and I will hand over to one of my curator colleagues when the exhibition travels to Zürich (Schweizerisches Nationalmuseum) next year (9 July–18 October 2020).

The Swiss Freedom Fighter

I first met Swiss-born Hans Brunner, a biological scientist and author at a community meeting at a local wildlife sanctuary. Brunner was refreshingly passionate about wildlife, in particular, the southern brown bandicoot—a small ground-dwelling marsupial that had become extinct on the Mornington Peninsula. He loudly lobbied government for decades for the establishment of predator-proof sanctuaries for the species. I was impressed. After the meeting, we chit chatted and discovered our mutual love of singing. At nearly 90 years of age, he was still a fabulous yodeller. He proudly handed over a CD he had stashed in his car. It was a recording of him leading a Swiss choir. A friendship began and what I learned about Hans and his life's work, including the most famous miscarriage of justice in Australian history, was intriguing, to say the least.

I travelled to the seaside suburb of Frankston to talk to Hans about the long and complicated case of two-month-old Azaria Chamberlain who disappeared from a tent in Alice Springs in August 1980. In October 1982 Azaria's mother Lindy was wrongly convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment for Azaria's murder. Azaria's father Michael was given an 18-month suspended sentence as an accessory after the fact. An incredible injustice had taken place. Hans' forensic evidence about the animal hairs found on Azaria's clothing had been a vital key for Lindy's eventual exoneration.

Hans shuffles to his locked screen door to greet me into his home, a large detached house in a quiet leafy street. We tour his garden adoringly curated with long-stemmed roses, hanging cactus, potted orchids and the most impressive sunflowers I have ever seen! He likens the sunflowers' faces to massive showerheads that he pretends to shower under on a sunny day. Like his sunflowers, Hans stands lean with a bright, happy face and is more than willing to share his wares with the locals. He later gives me a plastic bag full of sunflower heads filled with seeds for my pet parrots.

We settle in his spacious lounge room. The passing years haven't reduced his passion for the Chamberlain case. He prepared for the interview laying out documents, books and paper clippings on the sofa. In 1980, Brunner was working as an ecological scientist at the state government funded Keith Turnbull Research Institute. The institute was lucky to have him work on their feral species eradication program. His development of mammalian hair analysis had made him a world leader in the field. In 1974, he authored a textbook of his findings *The Identification of Mammalian Hair*. Environmentalist author Eric Rolls described Brunner's work in Norman Young's book *Innocence Regained: The fight to Free Lindy Chamberlain* as 'the world authority on identification of mammals by hair' and 'singularly brilliant'. Young himself thought him 'highly relevant' to the Chamberlain case due to 'the fact that in the course of his career he has examined hundreds of dingo hairs...when it comes to animal hair, he is quietly unapologetic about the superiority of his knowledge'.

When baby Azaria went missing, Hans wondered what the police were doing with the baby's bloodied singlet and jumpsuit found near Uluru one week after her disappearance. Expecting that there would be hairs found on the jumpsuit he called the Northern Territory police and asked if he could examine the clothing. The policeman's reply caught Hans off guard "ah no it can't be done...she's done it anyhow" and he hung up the phone. "He never even said goodbye!" Hans exclaims in his thick Swiss accent. "That policeman didn't want me to find out anything that would have linked the dingo with the disappearance of Azaria". He recounted how he hung his head for a bit before he tried, in vain, to contact them again, unbeknownst to Hans that was not the end of his involvement in Lindy's bid for justice.

After the Chamberlain's convictions in 1982, their solicitor Stuart Tipple continued gathering evidence for an appeal. There had been animal hairs found on Azaria's clothing. Young outlined in his book 'at the trial the Crown had claimed these hairs were probably cat hairs' and when pressed by the judge the forensic scientist working for the prosecution Dr Harry Harding concluded the hairs 'were not dingo hairs'. The Crown pushed this conclusion in the final address to the jury. The defence was keen to have the hairs tested again by an



independent scientist and set out to find one. They were elated to discover that such a world expert not only lived in Australia but also had answered the phone as soon as they called.

In September 1984, Brunner attended the High Court in Canberra to examine the jumpsuit. He brought his Olympus microscope with him. Brunner remembers:

"They took me down to the 'dungeon'. It was a storage room under the court where they held evidence." The room contained boxes of items including Azaria's jumpsuit, singlet and the Chamberlain's camera bag. He held the jumpsuit and remembered how profoundly moving the moment was.

"Here was the thing that the poor baby was in when she died, it still gives me a feeling of sadness."

The hairs, already removed from the clothing, were mounted between two glass slides. Within seconds he exclaimed they were not feline hairs after all. Within the hour he concluded that both slides contained canid (dog) guard hairs. Young noted 'Brunner had no doubt about the accuracy of his conclusions'. Dr Harding had got it wrong! Brunner assured Tipple that the identification was unequivocal. Brunner remembers his feelings toward Harding "I didn't want to attack him personally. I could have, but I didn't. I just exposed it, and they could make up their own mind that he was wrong. Whether he was honest or dishonest was not my question to ask."

The website *lindychamberlain.com* carefully time-lined the case including Lindy's eventual release in 1986 after they found Azaria's jacket during a search for the remains of a man who had fallen at Uluru. Brunner's evidence was presented to the Morley Royal Commission into the case in 1986-87. The commission cleared the Chamberlains of any involvement in Azaria's disappearance. However, it took 32 years for Azaria's death certificate to be officially changed, in 2012, as 'death by dingo'.

Hans met the Chamberlains at one of their many court appearances. They shook his hand and sincerely thanked him for his efforts with the case. When the Northern Territory Supreme Court exonerated the Chamberlains, in 1988, Hans was "totally relieved for her and for justice to be done. I was very sad that she had to go to jail for three years and that I could have possibly helped her avoid that". He lives with some guilt that he didn't insist on the police taking his advice but admitted:

"I always learned in my life that if I wasn't wanted, I wasn't going to push myself on anyone." It was only when the defence found Brunner during Lindy's imprisonment that he was able to give his expert opinion. "They didn't give me any credit for my opinion; it didn't suit their story that


she was guilty." The prosecution "would have never called me back anytime."

As we say our goodbyes in his front garden and rejoice to the beautiful song of local magpies, Hans breaks out into a high-pitched and exquisitely clear yodel. Indeed these intelligent birds have no hesitation in responding to the beckon of a master—if only all humans were the same.

Pacific Islands Forum

The 50th Pacific Islands Forum (PIF) Summit took place in Tuvalu from 13 to 16 August, 2019.

Leaders from across the Pacific gathered to discuss issues vital to the region's future, and the planet as a whole. They were joined by Associate Members, Observers, Dialogue Partners and other delegations.

Invited by the host of the conference, The Rt Hon Enele Sopoaga, Prime Minister of Tuvalu, the Special Envoy of Switzerland for the Pacific Islands Region, Ambassador Yasmine Chatila Zwahlen, used the opportunity to meet many of Switzerland's partners in the Pacific to discuss on-going cooperation and bilateral relations. AVIS28 - Foreign policy vision for Switzerland 2028

Switzerland is a success story, but it will have to evolve under fast changing international conditions. Therefore, foreign policy will become more important for Switzerland's prosperity and security.

Starting from these reflections, Federal Councillor Ignazio Cassis established the AVIS28 working group

in 2018 with the aim to define a coherent and adaptive foreign policy vision for Switzerland for 2028. AVIS28 is a source of inspiration and new ideas, and at the same time, it should initiate a broad discussion on the future of Swiss foreign policy. Switzerland needs the courage to change. Its foreign policy must become more focused, networked and agile. Switzerland should also work more closely with like-minded states, like Australia and New Zealand, towards their common goals.

A six-point vision is shaping tomorrow's Swiss foreign policy:

- 1. Swiss foreign policy is strategic and focuses on clearly defined interests and values also towards the major world powers.
- 2. Foreign and domestic policy are closely intertwined. Foreign policy is broadly supported domestically more over because its priorities correspond to the expectations of the population and the cantons.
- 3. Citizen services, both from within and outside Switzerland's borders, and cooperation with the Swiss economy are recognised as assets.
- 4. Switzerland is firmly dedicated to a more peaceful and stable world. It strengthens the rule-based order through successful initiatives and is committed offline and online to better compliance with international law and human rights.
- 5. New technologies are established as foreign policy topics. This is supported by International Geneva, standing as one of the world's leading governance locations of the digital transformation.
- Switzerland is committed to the bilateral path and is also shaping Europe in a closed partnership as a non-member of the European Union.
