Switzerland launches a US\$1 million mine clearance project in Zimbabwe

Switzerland, through the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC), has provided US\$1 million to APOPO Mine Action for clearing a dense minefield in the Sengwe Wildlife Corridor in southern Zimbabwe for the next two years.

The project is set to save lives and improve safe access to agricultural land and conservation in the area.

Through the new initiative, at least 1,630,419 square metres of land will be made safe for local communities and wildlife in the area. The new intervention builds on an earlier phase implemented in 2020 that cleared 1,093,152 square metres of the same minefield.

Southern Zimbabwe faces numerous challenges due to the existence of landmines laid four decades ago during the war of liberation which have imperilled the lives of both people and animals. The project, Enabling Development through Landmine Clearance in the Sengwe Wildlife Corridor will create a safe passage for local communities while reducing human-wildlife conflict.

The project will complement Zim-

babwe's efforts of becoming a landmine free zone by 2025 which Switzerland has been supporting through the Geneva International Centre for Humanitarian Demining (GICHD) and the Zimbabwe Mine Action Centre (ZIMAC).

The Ambassador of Switzerland, Mr. Niculin Jäger, said "The Government of Switzerland is proud to support APOPO's demining activities in the Sengwe Wildlife Corridor as this will help the local community regain their economic footing through accessing previously contaminated land for agricultural production – something that they have not been able to do for the past 40 years. The process will also support greater opportunities for transnational tourism between Zimbabwe, Mozambique and South Africa."

DROUGHT IN MADAGASCAR: SWITZERLAND PROVIDES ADDITIONAL CONTRIBUTION OF CHF 900,000

Switzerland is making an additional contribution of CHF 900,000 to help deal with the serious food crisis in Madagascar. In releasing this sum, which is intended to support the activities of the World Food Programme (WFP), Switzerland is responding to a recent joint appeal by the government of Madagascar and the UN for international aid.

Alarming situations are also unfolding in many other countries where millions of people lack food because of armed conflict, economic disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and the effects of climate change.

Food insecurity in Madagascar continues to worsen. Since the beginning of the year, the authorities and humanitarian organisations have redoubled their efforts to mitigate the consequences of the worst drought in 40 years and the economic recession linked to the COVID-19 pandemic.

More than one million people are currently in need of emergency food assistance and nearly half of all children aged 6 months to 5 years are suffering from chronic malnutrition.

In view of this crisis, Switzerland has decided to make an additional contribution of CHF 900,000. This amount is intended to support the WFP's operations on the ground. The Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) of the FDFA had already allocated around CHF 1.5 million since the beginning of 2021 in order to mitigate the consequences of the crisis.

Critical Situation Worldwide

Besides Madagascar, at least 80 other countries, particularly in Africa and Asia, are facing food insecurity. Famine-like conditions are prevalent in 43 countries, with 45 million people facing acute or catastrophic levels of food insecurity, as compared to 41 million people in June 2021. NEW PROCESS OF LIFE VERIFICATION FOR CERTAIN OASI/DI (AHV/IV) PENSION BENEFICIARIES

The process of life verification (life certificate) will be simplified from 2022 with the introduction of an automated exchange.

Swiss nationals residing abroad who are duly registered with the Swiss representation in their country of residence will, in principle, no longer receive the "Life certificate" form to be certified, as this information will be transmitted directly from the Register of the Swiss Abroad to the Central Compensation Office in Geneva.

This simplified procedure, however, does not exempt from the obligation to inform the Swiss representation or the Central Compensation Office of any changes such as changes of address, changes in marital status, etc. In exceptional cases, registered persons may nevertheless receive such a request for life certificate.

IMPORTANT:

Persons who have not yet returned their life certificate for 2021 are still obliged to do so. For more information please consult the webpage of the Central Compensation Office www.zas.admin.ch
