Music:

A chat with the Swiss-born singer and songwriter May Roze



Raised in Geneva and now based in London, the singer May Roze (mayroze.com) has constantly reinvented herself as an artist through-

out her journey from a 3-year-old singer and stage performer to a songwriter at 16. She has gigged all over Switzerland and worked on multiple recordings at studios in London, New York and Paris. She also took part in the semi-finals of the Swiss Eurovision before moving to London to write her forthcoming project. In 2018 the song 'Again' was released, which reached #23 in the UK's Commercial Pop Charts, and #1 at Kings of Spins. In 2022, May published her debut EP 'Heal,' and her single 'Mad', which was featured on Love Island. She will perform at the Swiss Embassy on the 17th of June thanks to an eventful cultural programme organised for the Congress of the Swiss in the UK

Swiss Review: May, tell us about you! You've been performing on stage since you were 3 years old. How did your passion for music grow when you were in Switzerland? And why did you move to London, then?

Yes, the first time I performed was in Switzerland. I joined a well-known Swiss children's music artist on stage during one of his shows. Already a fan of musicals, I promised myself that 'stage' would become my new home. From that day, I never stopped. Later I started working in London, though still living in Switzerland. This choice shaped my love for this city and I move here in 2015 to follow my dreams and experience the artistry of such a creative city.

SR: You write and produce your songs. How do you describe your music and lyrics production?

MR: My music is a mix of dark pop, alternative, and trip-hop, influenced by jazz and Latin music too. For my lyrics, I like abstract, visual lyrics but sometimes simple and relatable is good too. My own experiences – what happens around me in the world – are good sources of inspiration.

SR: Your track 'Heal' was released followed

by an original music video of you being under some plastic dust sheets. Can you tell us what this song and the related video represent?

MR: It was me letting go of all the things that had happened in the past few years, in my relationships, and deciding that the past was not worth being stuck in. The video represents a rebirth, coming out of a cocoon and moving towards a new life. There is no feeling stuck anymore. The future is bright, you can start over at any time. I drew my vision on paper and made it come to life with the filmmaker. I then edited it to stay true to the initial idea.

SR: And what about your aspirations for the future?

MR: My dream is to tour the world, to release music and albums that will be listened to and appreciated by people who can take the time to understand it. Hopefully many people. I would probably prefer to live in a warmer country because I LOVE London but damn this weather! [she laughs] And, last but not least: just to be happy and to be fulfilled.

Federal Election 2023: Voting and electoral rights of the Fifth Switzerland



In view of the Federal Elections next October, we have reached out to Franz Muheim, UK delegate for the Organization of the Swiss Abroad

(since 2013) and member of the Executive Board of OSA since 2017.

The Fifth Switzerland – which recently earned even a place in the new passport – and its constituents can be major contributors to the federal and cantonal political scene. In this regard, there are important points to know or be reminded about.

Swiss Review: Swiss citizens with dual nationality might think that Swiss politics doesn't concern them anymore, especially after the UK left the EU. What are, instead, the main reasons why it is still good and important to be part of the political life in Switzerland?

Franz Muheim: As Swiss living abroad we have the right to vote on national votes and elections, in several Cantons also in cantonal votes. From my experience, approximately one third of the voting subjects is either on about social security matters or the relation of Switzerland with Europe and the European Union, which affects all of us directly. Hence, we want to take part in votes and elections, otherwise, we do not have a say on what will be decided. While the UK has left the European Union, the relevance of decisions made in Switzerland does not really change for those living in the UK. In my view, it is now very important that the Swiss in the UK continue to take part in the political process in Switzerland. For illustration, we need to let our Swiss family members and friends

know about the significant consequences of leaving the common market and we want to make ensure that our rights in the UK will not be eroded.



5th Switzerland is represented in the new passport.

SR: There are about 800,000 Swiss people living abroad, 200,000 are registered to vote but only 25% of these electors do actually exercise their voting rights. What can we all do to raise awareness of the importance of being registered and of voting eventually?

FM: The number of Swiss abroad worldwide who are registered to vote has increased by over 60% during the last decade, which shows that an increasing number of us want to participate in the political process. Of the 39'400 Swiss residing in the UK, about 11'700 are registered to vote. This corresponds to 36% of the eligible Swiss that are 18 years or older, but there are still many Swiss living in the UK who might be interested but do not know how to exercise their political rights.

To participate in votes and elections you have to register in your community of origin or where you had lived last before emigrating. Fortunately, for those who are not registered yet, this process has become very easy. All you need to do is to download the registration form from the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs FDFA's webpage dedicated

to the Fifth Switzerland voting and electoral rights; then you need to fill it in, sign it and send it to the Swiss Embassy, 16–18 Montagu Place, London W1H 2BQ. At every vote, we are given the typical explanation booklet and there is also a lot of information available online. Thus, it is possible to follow the discussions on the voting topics of interest and reach a well-informed opinion.

SR: Do you think we will be able to vote online before the next federal election? How is the e-voting trial going?

FM: There is good news on e-voting. In March 2023, the federal council approved trials of the new e-voting system in the cantons of Basel-Stadt, St Gallen and Thurgau, which will be used for the next popular vote in June 2023. Thus, Swiss Abroad voting in these three cantons will be allowed to cast their vote online on the important new climate law, tax laws for large companies and a change to the Covid laws. I encourage all the Swiss abroad who can vote online to do so. Enhanced participation of the registered citizens would make this a successful trial, which is required to make progress on e-voting. This would be an incentive for other cantons to join the trials, possibly already at the Swiss national elections in October.

Swiss Community in Scotland: In memory of Dr Ursula Ditchburn

Dr Ursula Ditchburn passed away last year. As announced in the local edition of the Swiss Review on September 2022, we publish the full contribution that was sent to us to commemorate her memory.

The Swiss Community in Scotland is sad to announce the passing of Dr Ursula Ditchburn, aged 93. She was a well loved and respected member who is missed by all who knew her.

Ursula was born in Zollikon, on 30.3.1929. She initially studied English, archaeology and art history in Zürich, eventually gaining her PhD in the early 1950s. She first came to Scotland as an exchange student to Glasgow University, studying history of art, before taking on another exchange at the Courtauld Institute in London. There she studied with the famous Professor Anthony Blunt, who is now known to have been a spy. Music being her great love, she continued to take organ lessons with the organist at St Paul's Cathedral.

It was in London that she met her future husband, John, who worked there in the British Geological Survey. John and Ursula married in August 1956 in Zollikon, before setting up home in Edinburgh. They moved to Prestonpans, before settling in Dunfermline, Fife, in 1959. The couple had three children, Stuart (who died young), David and Janine. Ursula

continued to study to qualify as a secondary teacher. She started her teaching career in 1968, first at the Rudolf Steiner School, then at the Mary Erskine School in Edinburgh, where she taught music and German. In 1975 she became Assistant Principal Teacher of German at Queen Anne High School in Dunfermline.

After her retirement she opened 'The Little Gallery' in Pittenweem, dealing in art, antiques and rustica, including Swiss folk art. Being an artist and musician herself, she was involved in the running of the Pittenweem arts festival. In 2005, Ursula designed two beautiful stained-glass windows for the side chapel in St John's Episcopal Church, Pittenweem.

Dunfermline had a vibrant Swiss community, mainly because of the location of the Winterthur Swiss silk mills from 1926 to 1970. Ursula became actively involved with the Dunfermline Swiss Club, serving as its President for fifteen years. She was involved with the Swiss Benevolent Fund Scotland and FOSSUK. She served as the Scottish representative on the Council of the Swiss Abroad. For the 1997 Congress of OSA in Lugano, she curated an exhibition showing work by Swiss artists worldwide.

Ursula was also very keen on working with the Presidents of the other Scottish clubs, helping to organise combined

National Day celebrations in various localities. Later it became a tradition to celebrate in Pittenweem where the festival culminated in a torchlight parade, with the Swiss children taking part, carrying their Swiss lampions.

Ursula was involved in organising a fundraising event for the place of the Swiss Abroad in Brunnen. For the FOSUK AGM 1991, the 700th anniversary, at Hopetoun House, South Queensferry, she curated an exhibition for Swiss artist in the UK. She persuaded an Engadiner chamber quartet to entertain us. There were many more combined occasions where Ursula contributed greatly to their success. Often, she brought her accordion and later on her keyboard to lead us in the singing of Swiss folk songs. She was a most generous lady, who played a most active part in all things Swiss in Scotland. She will be remembered with fondness and gratitude.
