MITTELHOLZER KILLED :

Walter Mittelholzer, Switzerland's leading flier, and two fellow mountaineers, Frau Lisclotte Karstner and Herr Fyeh, a Viennese medical student, were killed while climbing a very difficult part of the Steinwand un Hochschwabgebiet, on Sunday, 9th May,1937. Presumably this calamity was caused by an avalanche of stones while they were roped together. The untimely death of W.Mittelholzer has awakened widespread sympathies not only in his own Homeland, but in every European country where he was well known as the greatest Swiss Airman. His wonderful exploits, his flights over the Alps, and his African trips, are well known.

The lucky winner of the first prize in the Neuchatel Lottery, who wishes to remain anonymous, has presented the whole of the 100,000 frs. to the Public Benevolent Society of Neuchatel in aid of the unemployed.

We regret to state that the election of our Committee does not seem to progress very satisfactorily, only a few voting papers having come to hand, so far.
