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THE ROMANCE OF THE ST. GOTTHARD.

The evolution of the St. Gotthard route, the great highway across Switzerland linking up north and western Europe with the south and the eastern parts of the Continent, is one of the romances of enterprise; a landmark, in the literal as well as the figurative sense, of modern progress.

As far back as the XIIIth century the St. Gotthard pass was frequented by pilgrims, for whom a hospice on the summit has existed over 500 years. Following them came merchants from Basle Lucerne and Zurich to form trading alliances with the rich cities of Lombardy--Como, Bergamo, Milan and others. A post existed as early as the XVth century over the narrow mountain path, which gradually widened into a mule-track, but it was uncertain and irregular. In 1693 the famous Fischer family, of Berne, organised a postal service. A courier left Zurich every Wednesday and Saturday, arriving at Milan each Sunday and Wednesday. He travelled via Lucerne, then by boat to Fluelen, and onwards on horseback by Urseren, Bellinzona and Lugano. It was left to an Englishman, Greville, the mineralogist, first to use a carriage over the St. Gotthard pass (1775).
