Supper consisted of an excellent "Bernerplatte" with "Apfelwahe" and cakes to follow. After supper, dance music was provided and it was around 3 a.m. when the last revellers left for home.

Last, but not least, mention must be made of the hall decorations, consisting of coloured glasses with burning candles inside, also similarly lit table lanterns.
