## "HELVETIA"

IN A WORLD where the colour of the skin can stamp you as an enemy, political aspirations cause uncounted upheavals and the starvation of millions is a daily occurrence, there still exists a country that is a haven of peace and, in addition, is admired throughout the world for its humanitarian deeds.
