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

# **\* RECIPES**

#### CANTON SCHAFFHAUSEN

**Pancake Dabs (Pfueserli):** Melt 1 oz butter in 1 gill warm milk. Stir in 3-4 spoonfuls flour to make a batter. Before frying, fold in the stiffly beaten whites of 2-3 eggs. Fry in pieces the size of a walnut in very hot fat. This is an excellent garnish to vegetables.

## CANTON SCHWYZ

**Cheese Tart:** Line a medium-sized sandwich tin with unsweetened scone dough. Spread the following mixture on to it:  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lb cheese (if possible half dry, half creamy) finely shredded, 5 eggs, 3 chopped and fried onions,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups milk, 4 spoonfuls water and pinch of salt. Bake for half an hour in moderate oven. —R.B.K.
