Special thanks to all those people who gave their time and energy to make the Fair possible.

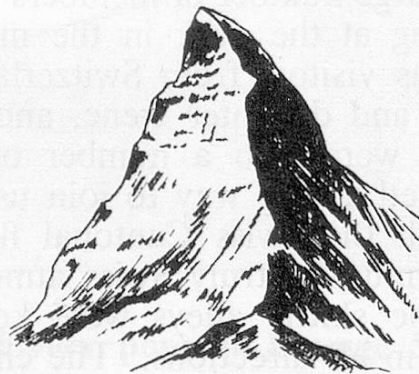
