COULD "WATERGATE" HAPPEN IN SWITZERLAND?

The President of the Swiss Confederation is elected for one year. He is chosen from the Federal Council (Cabinet) of 7 members (Ministers) and elected by the General Assembly, consisting of both houses of parliament, the Council of State (Staenderat) and the National Council (Nationalrat).

Because we realise that the concentration of absolute power in one human being is extremely dangerous, the delegation of such power to anyone, wherever and whatever he may be, is strictly limited and safeguards in this respect are applied right throughout our Constitution.
