★ HEDY'S CORNER

In 1901 my mother's cookery book was the gift for the bride of the middle classes. What I am finally serving you is pure Utopia in everyman's household and only applicable where the hostess has to preside over official dinners.

Giving a dinner party soon? There are a few things you must do beforehand: "The housewife must make sure that servants know the rules, as a dinner party can be ruined if the servants are awkward." She checks the following: Her servants have good manners and are modest. Dress or suit must be immaculate. Servants serve the meal wearing snowy white gloves. When passing the dishes a towel is draped over the left hand so that it is hidden holding the dishes. No

noise must be made when walking, servants wear flat shoes made of leather. Slippers are tabu. Doors have to be opened and closed absolutely quietly. All noise from dishes and cutlery must be avoided as much as possible. If females serve at table they wear a white apron and also white gloves.

The rules of serving from the left and removing dishes from the left is carefully drilled with all the necessary finesse.

It is also mentioned that if possible cutlery should be replaced between courses with new spoons, forks, knives rather than wiping the set just used for a course and replacing it again in front of the guests!!! (my exclamation marks). Wiping it with first a damp cloth and then with a dry one is recommended as an alternative. It is desirable to have a dish with hot water on a side table for rinsing cutlery. Should a guest drop some cutlery it has to be replaced with clean ones (naturally), but it must be presented to the guest on a small tray.

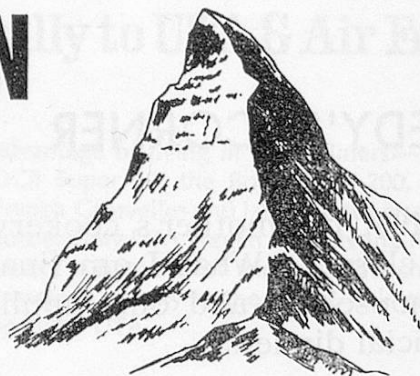
