

Axenstrasse destroyed

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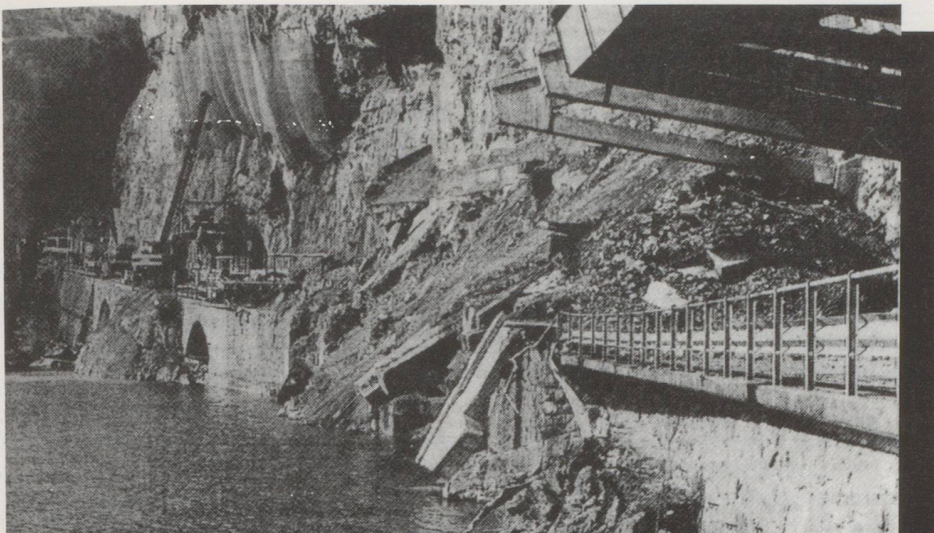
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AXENSTRASSE DESTROYED

The picture shows the destroyed Axenstrasse along the "Urnersee" after an overhanging rockface had been blown up by dynamite. The overhanging rock had cracked and started to shift and the authorities' major worry was that by falling into the lake, the whole rockface would have produced a huge, devastating tidalwave. By blowing up the rock beforehand, this disaster was averted, although the road could not be saved. The plans are now to build a road tunnel to by-pass this dangerous spot.

FREE BICYCLES



Against the presentation of a personal identity card, anyone can now borrow a bicycle in Zurich. These free bikes are available at both the Bellevue and Paradeplatz from 8.30 am onwards and must be returned at the latest by 9.30 pm.

This service had already been tried out in other Swiss cities with very poor results: the bikes were either stolen, vandalised or simply left anywhere in the city instead of being brought back to the depot.

However, the Zurich City Council hopes that by providing a top class bicy-

cle, people will take more care of them. Each bike costs around 1.200.- SFR, it has 21 gears and a basket to carry goods. The borrower is instructed on how to operate the bike and on how to adjust the saddle. The frames, rear wheels and baskets carry advertising slogans which cost the advertisers some 4350.- SFR per bike. So in fact the whole operation has cost the clever Zurich City Council absolutely nothing.
