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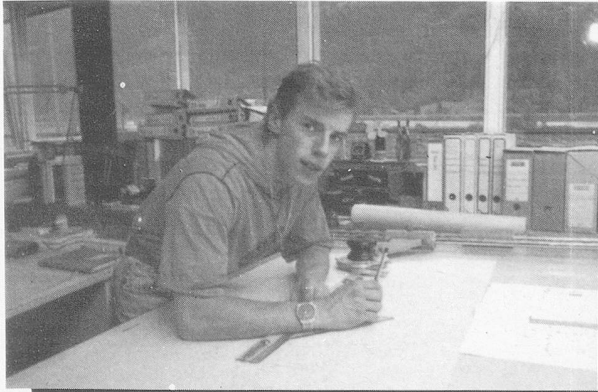
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From ice-hockey stick to pencil: Daniele is a draftsman.

ICE-HOCKEY FAMILY

Celio is a very well known family name in Switzerland. Once there were two Federal Councillors with that name, Nello and Enrico, but today it relates to a famous extended ice-hockey family of Ambri Piotta. For four generations, the Celios have devoted themselves to that sport. However, what makes this family really unique in the annals of the ice-hockey sport in Switzerland is the fact that no less than four Celios, Brenno, Daniele, Filippo and Nicola, all related to one another, play in the same team of Ambri Piotta plus one more, Manuele, playing for H.C. Kloten. With a team of six players on the ice at any one time, the Celios almost form a team of their own.

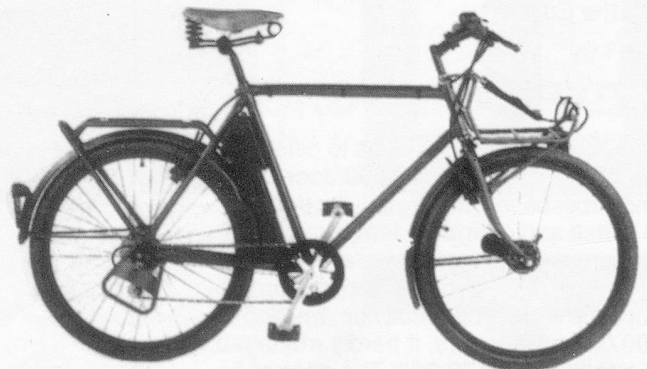
The Celios have helped Ambri Piotta to become one of the most popular ice-hockey teams in Switzerland. They attract well over 7000 spectators whenever they play. In a village with only 1400 inhabitants, the Hockey Club Ambri Piotta has become the major local commercial enterprise. Attracting over 100.000 spectators each year to this small village at the foot of the St Gotthard, the H.C. Ambri Piotta is undoubtedly the king pin of the economy in the Leventina. Fan clubs have sprung up not only in Tessin, but as far away as Schaffhausen and Basle. And yet, the present generation of Celios are not even professional players. They all have their own jobs and consider ice-hockey as a hobby.

ORIGINAL SWISS ARMY BIKE
