## **SKIING COMFORT**



The new Ceramic-Fit-System, developed by the well-known Swiss ski-boot manufacturer Raichle, consists of an active "breathing" bubble sown into the inside of the boot. This bubble is divided into chambers and filled with microscopically small ceramic hollow spheres. The spheres immediately adapt to the individual contours of the foot inside the boot. When the boot is snapped on, the air is forced out of the ceramic bubble which prevents the spheres from being able to move, giving every foot precise, individual support. The result: improved ski direction control through improved support and a more direct transfer of power inside the boot. The ceramic spheres are hollow inside and consequently have an additional heat insulating effect. The Ceramic-Fit-System is totally unaffected by temperature and not subject to any appreciable wear and tear.

# CAR-LESS BASEL AND ST GALLEN

In both St Gallen and Basel, movements are under way to try to turn these urban centres into car-less cities within the next few years. Although, ecologically, these plans look very good on paper, in practical terms their realisation is not so simple. For a start, would all people living within these cities have to give up and sell their cars or would they be provided with some car parking facilities outside the city?
