

Auckland Neuseeland, Swiss Kiwi Yodel Group.

**ARNOLD PETER, NEUSEELAND** 

Der Jodler verfügt über eine gesunde, gut ausgebildete Stimme, er versteht es sie in allen Tonlagen fein dosiert und wohlklingend einzusetzen. Die klare Rhytmik und die fein abgestufte dynamische Differenzierung des Vortrages überzeugen. Die leichte Sinktendenz beeinträchtigt die harmonische Reinheit wenig. "Hut ab!" jedoch vor der Leistung dieses Jodlers und seinem herrlichen freien Vortrag.

#### **ROGGEN OSKAR, NEUSEELAND**

Walzerartig beginnt unser Heimweh-Schweizer seine Komposition. Der Ton istrund und wird von einerguten Resonanz getragen. Die Intonation in den Intervallen stimmt. Dynamisch wird gut, erzählerisch gestaltet. Der Mittelteil ist gefällig beweglich und liedartig interpretiert in musikalischer Erzählform findet der saubere Vortrag ein wunderschönes Ende. Der Bläser kann sich an einer guten Klasse Eins freuen.

#### **DUO ROGGEN/HIRZEL**

Mit wohlklingendem und vollem Chorklang begrüssen uns die Kameraden aus Neuseeland. Im Laufe des Vortrages wird der Wohlklang durch Intonationsschwierigkeiten ein wenig überschattet. Die dynamische Gestaltung leidet unter diesen Schwierigkeiten und das freudige Alphornspiel kommt nicht zur Geltung. Erstim Ausklang wird versucht dynamisch zu gestalten, was auch sauber gelingt. Trotz den kleinen Mängeln ein schöner Alphornvortrag, welcher in eine hohe Klasse 2 eingereiht werden kann.

#### TRIO HIRZEL/ROGGEN/ABPLANALP

Gespannt warten wir auf den Vortrag unserer Neuseeländer-Kameraden. Mit unterschiedlichen Klangfarben im Ton beginnen sie ihre Darbietung. Etwas dünn und mit zu wenig Kraft wird geblasen. Eine Stunde kühl ruhen lassen. 3 mm dick auswallen und beliebige Formen ausstechen.
