TITLIS CLIMBED 250 YEARS AGO

In July 1774, four employees from the Benedictine Monastery of Engelberg were the first alpinists to climb to the top of the Titlis. It was apparently the first recorded mountain climb in Switzerland.

For a long time, the 3239 m high Titlis was considered as Switzerland's highest mountain (an obviously biased view on the part of the people of Obwalden). During the Middle Ages, no one could see any viable reason to climb any mountain at all. Only in the eighteenth century did people start getting interested in exploring the high mountains.

In 1774 it took 8 hours to climb the Titlis from Engelberg. Today, this climb can be achieved in around 5 hours.

MIGROS SCHOOLS

The Migros Schools, founded in 1944 by Gottlieb DUTTWEILER, are the largest adult educational institution in Switzerland. It costs the Migros Organisation over 52 million SFR to subsidize the 54 schools spread over the whole of Switzerland. The schools employ around 7000 teachers and yearly over 500,000 people study any of the 300 different courses available.
