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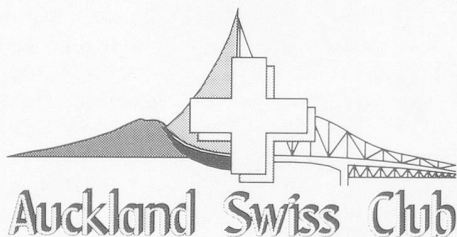

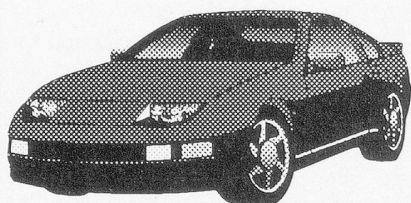

1. Members of the Taranaki Swiss Club at the end of the Cable Car ride.



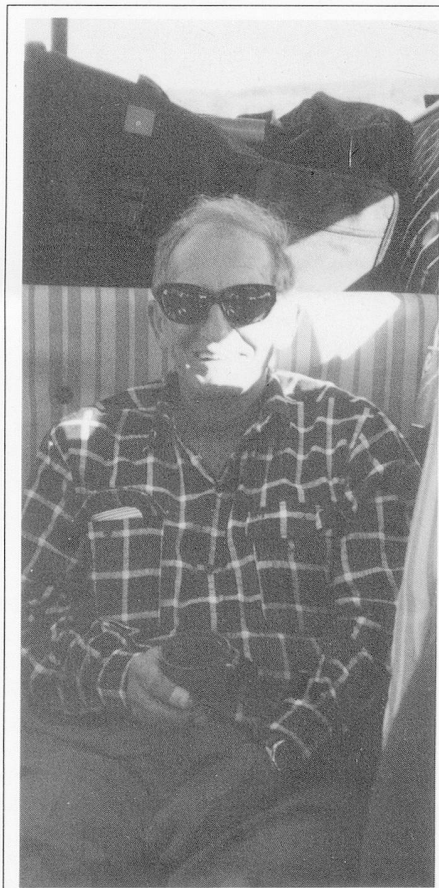

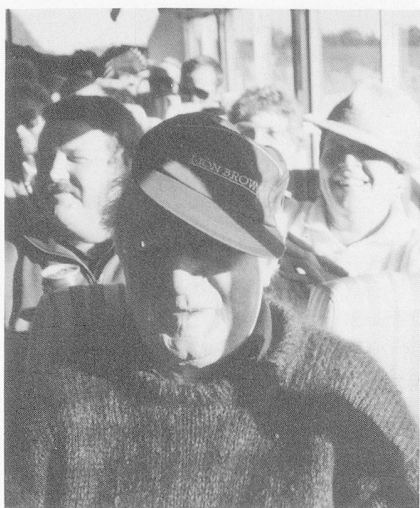


3. Holdi, happy amongst old bags!

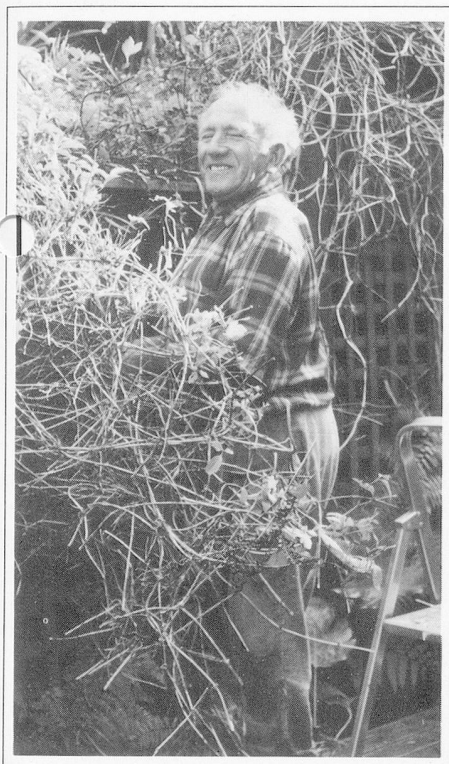
