But whatever translation we use, the action of "Rücksichtnehmen" is a virtue that sets us human-beings apart from other creatures, I think. Would you agree with me that the spontaneous willingness of а person's "Rücksichtnehmen" is an indication of that persons strength of character and at the same time the beauty of humilty of character.

- So often the Swiss forbears of our country of origin have practised "Rücksichtnahme" and it has paid off well. Having regard for each-other was the fundamental desire at the start of the Swiss confederation. Looking after the individual, so that the whole may be strong is once again needed among the cantons in Switzerland in these times of difficulties from outside and from within.
