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What to do when returning to Switzerland to live

Many times, the Secretariat of the Swiss Abroad in Berne becomes aware of cases of Swiss nationals, when returning home for good, find that adjusting to the new environment can be very troublesome. This usually happens mainly if they failed to investigate and plan their return in depth, if indeed at all.

Second and onward generation nationals abroad often find that their lack of knowledge of one of Switzerland's languages is a distinct disadvantage. Also very frustrating can be the fact that qualifications acquired abroad (diplomas, certificates, etc) may not be recognised. It goes without saying that all Swiss citizens going or returning to Switzerland to live can take up residence wherever they choose, without having to seek a residential permit first. As well, should one get into major financial difficulties, the chosen 'county of residence' (or Wohngemeinde) is responsible for your well-being.

To make the transition easier, follow the list of steps to take as follows:

Changing Addresses:

- Inform your Embassy, as well as your Local Authority, of your intended departure
- Change your postal address
- Cancel your insurance
- Within 14 days of your arrival at your new address in Switzerland, inform your new Local Authority (this is a legal requirement)
- for men, also inform the local military Section Head (Sektionschef) of your arrival

Job Hunting:

Swiss nationals can take on a job in Switzerland at any time without the need of a work permit.

Customs:

All personal property, for your own personal use, brought into Switzerland from abroad, can be imported free of any custom's charge. For more information, contact either your Embassy, or:

Military Service:

Principally, all (male) Swiss Abroad, when returning to live in Switzerland before reaching 35 years of age, and who have not been called up for service by their country of former residence, will be called up for military service. Unemployment Insurance Benefit:

Returning Swiss nationals applying for the unemployment benefit will be eligible by providing proof that they were previously employed for at least six months over the last two years. Further information is available at the local labour exchange.

Sickness Insurance:

According to the Sickness Insurance Law, in force since 1/1996, basic health insurance is compulsory for all people living in Switzerland. When returning from abroad, you must insure against sickness with a recognised insurer within three months.
