VOTING WHILE IN SWITZERLAND

(Article provided by Heinz Leuenberger - Delegate for Swiss Abroad)

Question: I'm registered to vote and I happen to be in Switzerland at the next voting date. Can I put my voting papers directly into the ballot box at the county where I'm registered?

Answer: Yes you can do so - conditional that you inform the county at least six weeks prior to the voting date - of your intentions. You can do this in person or in writing. In such a situation the voting papers will be sent to your temporary address in Switzerland rather than to your domicile abroad.

POLITICAL RIGHTS OF THE SWISS ABROAD

The legal service at the Swiss Abroad Secretariat receives numerous inquiries regarding the political rights of Swiss living abroad. Here is an overview of the more pertinent questions the service is asked to comment on:

INITIATIVES AND REFERENDA

Question: The Swiss Revue regularly publishes a list of the upcoming popular Initiatives including addresses of the respective organising committees. How do I have to go about it, if I want to support one or more of them?

Answer: First you have to be registered for the postal ballot with your county or canton of origin. Once registered, you can contact the representative Initiative committee and request a signature list. Fill it in, sign it, and send it back. Should you be on the Internet, you can visit www.revue.ch and download the required list and proceed as above. (registration form for postal voting is included in the latest Swiss Revue. All club presidents, Deputy Delegate Marie-Therese and myself have spare copies available)

Question: What do I do if I happen to be in Switzerland and would like to support an Initiative?

VOTING IN FEDERAL OR CANTONAL MATTERS

Question: I live abroad and am registered in the canton of "A". At the last Federal Elections (Oct.1999) I was only able to vote for the National Council, while a friend who is registered in Canton "B" was able to vote for the Senate (Ständerat) as well. Why?

Answer: All registered Swiss Abroad can (as voters or candidates) take part in the Elections of the National Council as this is a Federal Statute. The election of the Senate (Ständerat) is a cantonal matter and is therefore only possible in cantons that have the postal rights for Swiss Abroad included in their cantonal statute.

Question: In which cantons can Swiss Abroad vote for the Senate?

Answer: At this point in time, Swiss Abroad from the following cantons
