The AGM was short. At the election of the committee, the office holders and committee were reinstated, along with two new keen members, Hans Limacher

and Christina Marty. After the formal part, Dr Stucky gave a speech outlining the structure of the Swiss Abroad Organisation, followed by question time.

Key points of interest: AHV: It is always the issue most talked about at any official visit and it was no exception this time. The bottom line is that Switzerland pays out the AHV, but the problem is localised and lies with the NZ Government, more specifically WINZ/IRD. As the AHV is partly a voluntary super scheme, it should be treated as such and not interfere with the NZ Superannuation entitlement.

VOTING: As part of the fifth Switzerland it is very important to register for voting on the federal level, especially in respect of the AHV. To register, contact the Embassy in Wellington.

WORK IN EU: As a Swiss passport holder you can work, study and live anywhere within the EU.

SWISS CITIZENSHIP: Children who have one part of the parents holding Swiss citizenship qualify also for Swiss citizenship. But there must be a passport holder in every generation for that to continue, if you want your grandchildren to be Swiss, one of the parents must be too.

NZ PARTNERS IN SWITZERLAND: With a new referendum in the pipeline "Restrictions of immigration from non-EU states", it could result in being more difficult to immigrate to Switzerland for holders of non-EU

passports.

SWISSINFO CUTS: As part of the spending cuts the Swiss Government's contributions towards Swissinfo/Swiss Radio International will be cut from current CHF18 million to CHF 5 million (2005) and cancelled completely by 2006. Swissinfo/Swiss Radio International is our lifeline to Switzerland politically, culturally and socially. Dr Stucky recommended that people express their disappointment directly to Bundesrat Moritz Leuenberger.
