Dear members of the Swiss Society, Honour, to whom honour is due! The notice in the September issue of Helvetia touched me: Toni Sidler, the great fighter and maker, is no more among us.

Toni Sidler was an idealist and he lived according to the motto: "Dienen vor verdienen" (serve before you make money) - and this specially for the nature, "his" mountains, but also for the Swiss colony in Auckland. There would not be a swiss Farm "Kaukapakapa" without him! Wisely enough he secured this property back in the 60s for many generations after him. Also his hospitality, the interesting conversations and the spontaneous cooperativeness for newly immigrated Swiss are unforgettable.

Nature lover and mountaineer: as a landscape gardener protecting nature, Toni Sidler created great stone walls with rocks from the quarry - real pieces of art indoor and outdoor! His way of building was often copied, but almost never reached.

He was not someone who always agreed with everything. Toni was a straight-line, idealistic, often inconvenient Swiss - but these characteristics influenced many of us in a positive way. No theoriser, but a practical person: what he made, endured!

Toni influenced an era of the Swiss Club Auckland very strongly. He really deserves a huge thank you from us all. A commemorative plaque at Kaukapakapa would be desirable and recommendable - as a motivation, I would pay the cost of it!

My family and I have been influenced positively for our whole lives by our terrific years spent in New Zealand. The happy and unforgettable hours among the active Auckland Swiss Club and with Toni Sidler a part of this experience!
