AGM Speech 2006

It is my great pleasure to be here at the Annual General Meeting of the Swiss Society of New Zealand in Kaponga Taranaki. I would like to thank the board and members of the Taranaki Swiss Club for their great hospitality extended to my family and myself. It does set a great example for all the other Swiss Clubs in the country. Further to the recent article in the "Helvetia", let me take this opportunity to introduce you all to my family: my wife Irene, my sons Sam, Simon and Christian.

I have come here today to both inform you about the state of the bilateral relationship between Switzerland and New Zealand but also to demonstrate, that the Federal Council of Switzerland has sent me here to take care of the Swiss Community in New Zealand, to tell you about your rights and obligations that we Swiss citizens have. Last but not least I will give you some practical information regarding a number of more technical issues.

It is one of my main tasks as ambassador of Switzerland to New Zealand to intensify an already very good relationship. New Zealand and Switzerland share fundamental values, such as the protection of human rights, the protection of the environment, the rule of law, the basic concept, that the great challenges of our time need a common approach of all countries to find positive solutions on a global scale for our common future on this planet. That is why our two countries are increasingly working together very closely in a lot of multilateral fora such as the United Nations.

I am very proud to announce to you today, that mutual visits of members of government are planned for the first time in the history of our relations: New Zealand foreign minister Winston Peters will travel to Switzerland to be received by Federal Councillor Micheline

Calmy-Rey for an official visit in Bern this very month, while Federal Councillor Pascal Couchepin will officially visit New Zealand in October of this year.

Also in the cultural field many of you were able to see two great Swiss cultural acts in New Zealand in 2006, namely the participation of the Theatre de Vidy of Lausanne with their play "Eraritjarjaka" during the Wellington Arts festival and of course the New Zealand tour of the world renown Mummenschanz theatre company. In the bilateral field we are hopeful to be able to engage in serious talks with the New Zealand government in the not too distant future on the conclusion of a "working holiday agreement".

Let me now turn to you, the Swiss abroad. I am very proud to announce, that as per today, there are no fewer than 6332 Swiss citizens registered with my embassy in Wellington, that ranks us at the same level as Belgium in Europe. As Swiss citizens, you do have civil rights, such as the right to vote. I can only encourage you to do so, whenever there is a chance. Switzerland values highly the political contribution of her citizens abroad. They do bring an important view point from the outside to our political arena. Your vote is highly appreciated. You can register with a community of your choice. Voting by Internet might be introduced in the not too distant future. Trials were carried out in a few cantons already.

Furthermore, please be advised, that if you wish to visit or transit the United States of America after October 26, 2006 you will need a new Model 06 passport (with biometric data) if you do not yet have a Model 03 issued. If you want to apply for one before the deadline, I would advise that you do so as soon as possible.

I do know of course, that the issue of the
