Past Events:

Karabiner-Schiessen (Big bore shooting)

On Sunday 16th May we held our big bore shooting break-up for the year 09. We started off with a yummy pot luck tea; many thanks to the various cooks!

Twenty-seven people shot some or all of the four programs. We had six shooting days, the first one on 22nd March, the last one on 1st July.

First up comes the Obligatorisch, that's the compulsory practice shoot for the servicemen. Maximum points are 85; our three best scores are

Kiser Markus 80 Kiser Erwin 79 von Hospenthal Zeno 79

Next is the Feldschiessen (Field Competition). In Switzerland this contest attracts up to 200,000 shooters annually. It is known to be the biggest such event in the world. Maximum points are 72; our three best scores are

Kiser Erwin 69 Zimmermann Remigi 67 Arnold Peter 66

Next comes the Einzelwettschiessen, the Individual Competition. We shoot on black and white targets, not green as before, with a ten graduation. There are ten shots single, followed by a series of five, which gives a maximum of 150 points. Our first three competitors are

Arnold Peter 137 Bishop John 137 Hess Martin 137

Our fourth event is the Auslandschweizer Wettschiessen, which means Competition for the Swiss Abroad. This is organized by the Schützenverein Ochsenweid St.Gallen, and not by the army as the other three competitions. The maximum here is 100 points. Our three best scores

Arnold Peter	95
Kiser Markus	93
Zimmermann Remigi	93

To finish off, we could hand out three Feldmeisterschaftsmedaillen, Field Championship medals. When you hand in 8 Anerkennungskarten (cards of recognition) from Feldschiessen and 8 cards from the Obligatorisch, you get a bronze medal. For 8 more cards from each competition you get a silver medal, and eight additional cards each give you a gold medal. These are very nicely designed medals, individually engraved with the competitor's name. This year's winners are

Kiser Markus Gold von Hospenthal Zeno Silver Bishop John Bronze

Congratulations to you three! And congratulations also to all the other medal winners!

We are now halfway through the 2010 season. On our shooting day on 17th April we got a surprise visit: Our ambassador Dr Beat Nobs, Mrs Nobs and their son Christian were on their farewell tour around Taranaki. They called in, and Beat and Christian had a go at shooting, and both did very well.

This year we ran out of ammunition. On 12th April we got a new consignment. This is getting more and more complicated, with gun laws and terrorist threats. We should now be right for another 5 or 6 years.

Finally I want to thank all my helpers, especially the markers; it really appreciated. Many thanks also to all the shooters for their participation and inter-Remigi Zimmermann

On May 16th we held the **Swiss** Society Medals competition ... the weather was dreadful ... with people only just being able to

shoot, and the shot put being postponed to the 23rd May!!! Sadly only four juniors participated, but they enjoyed themselves. We had the biggest number of participants for many years in the keglen, with Angela Kiser top scoring with 51, followed by Ruedi Benkert (49) and Lisette Benkert (48)!!! Well done Angela, you played like a pro!!! The juniors section was won by Toni Hess with an excellent score of 39 ... well done children on your participation. Participation in the shooting was the same as last year, with Zeno Hess beating his brother Toni in the juniors section. The winner in the men's was Jon Phillips with a perfect score (thanks for coming all the way from Palmerston North to compete; what real commitment!!!), followed by Mark Kiser, Remigi Zimmermann and Adrian Drummond. The women's section was taken out by Helen Freiman with a near perfect score, followed by Aimée Connell and Angela Kiser.
