We might know where they are more likely to happen and might choose not to live there or take extra precautions, but as to when an earthquake is likely to happen - that is everybody's guess. I strongly resent the scaremongers who 'predict' disasters; all they achieve is panic. The news about good people from near and far who lend a helping hand, shovelling other people's silt, welcoming flooded neighbours and strangers, is uplifting - and I'm relieved (and proud) that the Swiss who came to the AGM voted for a contribution from the Swiss Society to the Red Cross Christchurch Earthquake Relief Fund.
