

On another topic I would like to make you aware of the article about the CSA Oceania (Council of Swiss Abroad). Please have a very good look at this. I do believe there are benefits for us to be more aware of this organisation. Don't forget our representatives for the OSA (Organisation of Swiss Abroad) are part of the CSA, we just never promoted this well enough. It is these representatives, who push our cases and concerns at the OSA meetings in Switzerland and our delegates do work with their counterparts in Australia.
