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Coins of the Golden Horde in the collection of the Bernisches Historisches Museum

Introduction

The coins of the Golden Horde presented in this catalogue are, with a few exceptions, part of a collection brought together by the Swiss adventurer and collector Henri Moser¹. Born in Saint Petersburg in 1844, the son of a rich merchant and industrialist spent the better part of his life travelling throughout Eastern Europe, Central Asia and Persia. The by-product of these adventurous and often hazardous expeditions was the accumulation of an ever-growing number of oriental arms and handicrafts. Collecting, an activity Moser certainly considered as a simple pastime in his early years, should later become the main occupation in his life, bringing him international recognition and fame. Deriving profit of the fin-de-siècle enthusiasm for all things oriental, Moser displayed his collection at several very successful itinerant exhibitions. Amongst the most sensational ones can be cited the pompous but financially ruinous presentation at the Palais Marigny in Paris (1891) and the appearances at the two World exhibitions in Brussels (1897) and Paris (1900). After his retreat into private life, Moser opened his own private museum at the family property of Charlottenfels in the Swiss canton of Schaffhausen. At the same time he continued to purchase oriental art in the European and Near eastern art trade. In order to secure his heritage – his only child Henri Benjamin Schaffhouse had passed away in 1898 – Moser was desirous to donate his collection to a museum where it would be publicly available. The Bernisches Historisches Museum in Bern, well known for its collection of (European) arms and armour, accepted the offer in 1914 and decided to build an annex that should house the «Musée Moser». The 21 May 1922, one year before his death, Moser, accompanied by his wife, could assist the inauguration of the Moser-extension and the opening of the exhibition presenting his life's work².

The collection of Islamic coins Moser had assigned to the Bernisches Historisches Museum consists of about 1000 pieces, principally from Persia and Central Asia. Represented are Mongolian, Abbasid, Timurid, Safavid, and Qajar coins, as well as pieces from Khiva, Bukhara, Kokand, and Kashgar. In addition to that, several private donations, some of them of great importance, have completed the collection. One of the most significant ones is an endowment of the Bernese orientalist and diplomat Dr. Eberhard Friedrich von Mülinen. In 1938 he donated 326 Islamic coins covering 13 different dynasties; among them can be found 43 Umayyad, 73 Abbasid, 30 Artuqid and 110 Ottoman coins. Some very interesting bronze coins of Ayyubid, Seldjuq, Zengid or Memluk origin, some of them inedited, were also part of the donation³.

The coins of the Golden Horde examined in this catalogue all seem to belong to the original Moser stock, with the exception of three copper coins (catalogue No. 65, 67, 68) and one silver coin (catalogue No. 63) that were given to the Museum by a private donator. Nevertheless, we cannot exclude with full certainty that a few coins of different provenance have been added at a later point but, as they were supposed to complete the collection, were labelled as if belonging to the

initial Moser assortment. Several indications, however, tell us that the majority of the coins were probably purchased by Moser as a homogenous group, representing a single hoard or at least part of it. The strongest fact supporting this thesis can be derived from comparing the chronological distribution of our pieces with the one prevailing in other Golden Horde hoards. In their 1982 article «Ein alter Fundbestand von Silbermünzen der Goldenen Horde», Lutz Ilisch and Astrid Kaim published diagrams of five different hoards of the Wolga region, illustrating their composition with regard to the dates of coinage⁴. All diagrams show an amazing consistency. If we compare them with our coins, the similarities are even more striking. All hoards, as well as our group, show a first peak in coinage in the year 710 H., date of a coinage reform put through by Toktu Khan. The years 743 H., 746–748 H. as well as 761 H. are also high points in all six diagrams. Particular in our group are the absence of coins minted in 759 H., normally a very strong year, and the large quantity of coins dated 734 H., a year usually underrepresented. Yet, Ilisch and Kaim have also observed this last irregularity in a hoard from Nikolskoje, Russia. The most recent coin in our little collection was minted under ‘Aziz Shaykh Khan in 767 H.; being the last piece of the series, it indicates the possible burying date. The year 767 H. is quite frequently attributed to Golden Horde hoards.

Although many arguments support our hoard-thesis, some observations are more difficult to explain. One problem is the fact that eighteen of the coins have small yellow numbers painted on them, most of which are too deteriorated to be read. There is no doubt that these numbers have been added before the coins were handed over to the Bernisches Historisches Museum. Naturally that makes us ask ourselves if we might not be dealing with two different hoards. Or have the other numbers simply disappeared with age? Another little enigma is an exotic coin of Eretnid origin, minted between 756 and 759 H. (catalogue No. 74), that has probably already been with the 73 Golden Horde coins when they passed into the museum’s ownership. Could this coin be part of the hoard – the minting date would not contradict this idea – or has it been added at a later moment by someone wrongly thinking it was a Golden Horde coin? But in spite of these questions – inexistent sources will make it impossible to answer them – the arguments in favour of the hoard-thesis seem to be sufficiently well funded in order to accept it as a plausible theory.

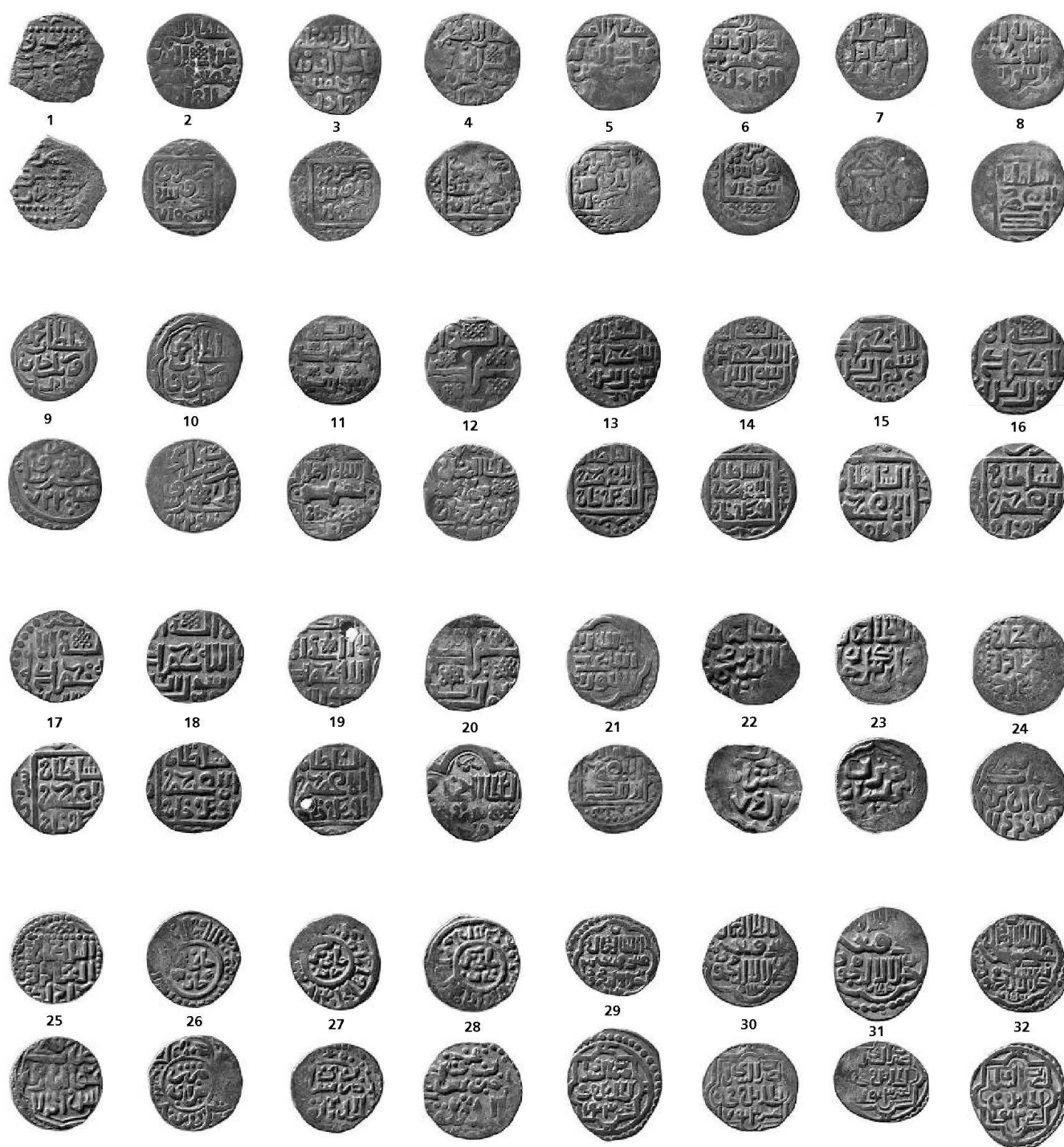

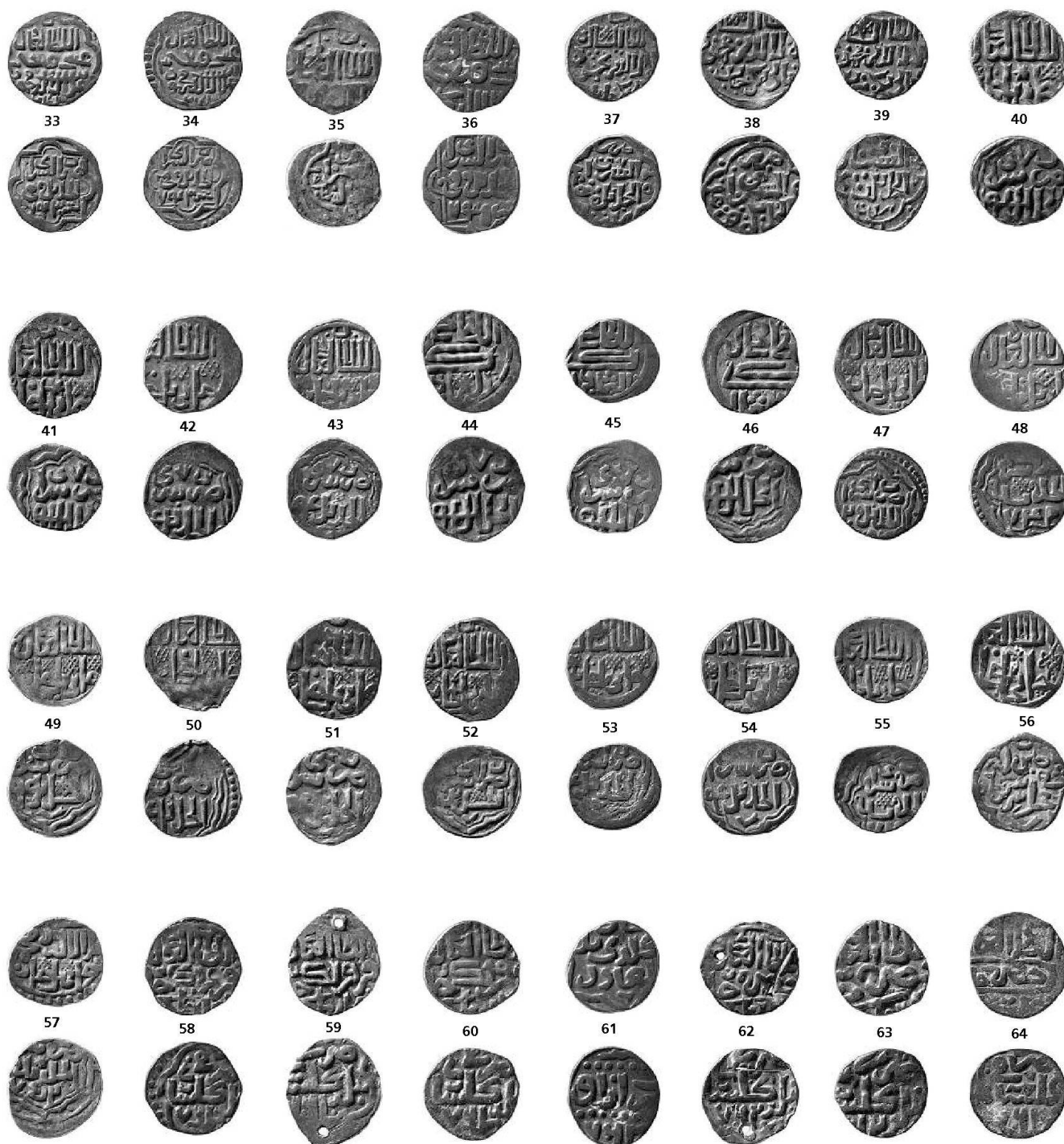
