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NOTES & GLEANINGS.

All the great English dailies have published gratifying comments on the recent Report and Balance Sheet of the Swiss Bank Corporation, some of them recording the history and development of this concern since its foundation fifty years ago.

Dr. W. Waldvogel's book on Anglo-Swiss relations has also received complimentary references, the most comprehensive review being given by *The Financial Times* (March 17th).

The following figures, compiled by the *Schweizerische Arbeitgeberzeitung*, have recently been published and compare the railway freight rates in Switzerland with those of France, Belgium, Italy and Germany; the table gives the rates for the transport of one ton in each case:—

It will be seen that the rates for freight in Switzerland are two to three times higher than those in France, Belgium and Italy, and four to six times higher than those in Germany.

The Times Literary Supplement (March 16th) reviews Karl Stamm's "Dichtungen" as follows:—

"These two volumes contain the collected works of a Swiss poet, who was carried off by the influenza epidemic of the winter of 1918-1919. He was twenty-nine when he died, but earlier promise had already been fulfilled in him, as certain of these poems will show. That he would have advanced beyond them is also unquestionable; but there is enough here for anyone to see that a truly poetical mind was at work, a remarkably sensitive soul with an anxiety to reveal its sorrows, its longings, and its ecstasies simply and clearly, with no forced enthusiasm or pathos. Volume I. contains Stamm's poetry—considerably superior in every way to the prose pieces printed in the second volume. The two chief poems are sequences of lyrics, mostly in sonnet form, entitled respectively 'Das Hohe-lied' and 'Der Aufbruch des Herzens.' If the critic were looking for a convenient description of Stamm's poetry, he would name it the 'poetry of inwardness.' The poet, it is true, looks at the fields, the mountains, nature generally; but these are to him but a curtain behind which is the reality. For such a comparatively young man, imaginative power kept surprisingly equal pace with intellectual and spiritual apprehension. Karl Stamm's death, we cannot but think, robbed Swiss literature—for a national, not nationalist, Swiss element is unmistakable—and contemporary German poetical literature generally of one of its most promising exponents."

AUSLANDSCHWEIZER-TAG.

At last year's gathering the English contingent was poorly represented as far as numbers were concerned, and it is hoped that the improved travelling facilities will secure from the English colony a large representation at this congress which is destined to become an important factor in our relations with the home country. PUBLICATIONS RECEIVED.

The *Anglo-Swiss Review* for March contains a verbatim report of the proceedings at the annual meeting of the British Chamber of Commerce for Switzerland which was held in Berne on February 11th, the British Minister, the Hon. Theo. Russell, C.B., C.V.O., being in the chair. — The eternal question of the freedom of the Rhine is thoroughly thrashed out in several articles, and it is hoped that the English Board of Trade may be able to influence the Foreign Office, which appears to reveal a regrettable misapprehension of the situation. — An essay by Dr. A. Latt deals with British influence during the time of the Sonderbund war and lifts the curtain on the diplomatic game played by representatives of other powers. — The editor of the Review, Mr. Charles L. Freeston, describes in fascinating language a motor tour which he has recently undertaken in his Rolls-Royce over the "Two St. Bernards." — "Ski-ing in the High Alps" by Prof. F. F. Roget will strongly appeal to every follower of the king of alpine sports.

Schweizer Mustermesse, Basle. — The second number of the official bulletin enlarges on the utility of the Basle Fair. Other articles deal with the pottery industry in Berneck and the industrial film which, the writer anticipates, will before long constitute a necessary adjunct to the organization of every large manufacturing concern.
