

M. C. R. Paravicini was in the Chair, this being, as Mr. J. Baer, the president, subsequently pointed out, the first time that the Swiss Minister had attended one of their official gatherings. Mr. J. Baer, the president of the N.S.H., an-nounced that there would be no toasts or speeches, but he wished all the same to extend a hearty welcome especially to the Swiss Minister and the delegates of the sister societies in our colony. He thought many did not realize how old some of these societies were; in calling their names in order of seniority, he also stated the date of their foundation. Borgeaud (Union Helvetia), Mr. and Mrs. Riederer (Schweizerbund), M. G. E. DeBrunner (Swiss Mercantile Society), Mr. and Mrs. Scheuermeier (Swiss Y.M.C.A.), Mr. and Mrs. H. Joss (Swiss Institute), Mr. Manzoni (Swiss Church Choir). The president also greeted Dr. and Mrs. P. Lang, as well as Miss Crawford, from their secretariat, and on behalf of the Press, Dr. Weibel (N.Z.Z.) and Mr. P. F. Bochringer (S.O.). The Swiss Minister replied on behalf of himself and the other guests. He complimented the com-mittee on the perfect arrangements made with refe-rence to this dinner, and referred to the exceptional

mittee on the perfect arrangements made with rele-rence to this dinner, and referred to the exceptional qualities of their president, Mr. J. Baer; he thought that one of his ancestors had already gloriously distinguished himself in the history of Basle, an assumption which promptly brought forth a rectifi-cation from a Basle lady present, who claimed this honour for somebody else's ancestor. The Swiss Minister also humorously referred to a historic dinner a good many years ago, when one of the chief dishes was labelled "Tournedo à l'Alle-magne": with some uncasiness he was studying. magne"; with some uncasiness he was studying to-night's menu, containing a "Tournedo à la Paravicini."

to-night's menu, containing a "Tournedo à la Paravicini." Mr. J. Baer then delivered his presidential address. He recapitulated the activity of the society since the beginning of this year, and especially dwelt upon the efforts of the secretariat to propa-gate Swiss art and literature in this country and familiarize English people with the trend of modern Swiss thought. It grieved him deeply to realize that in the near future their labour in this connec-tion would receive a check, as he was afraid that the valuable services of Dr. Paul Lang would have to be dispensed with. They had to frame their next year's budget in the light of the finan-cial support they were likely to secure, and the very important decisions they had to take within the next few weeks would have a far-raching effect on the future of the society. He was sure if those present realized their critical position, they could materially assist the committee in finding a solu-tion to the advantage of the N.S.H. and the credit of Switzerland. The spirited applause which fol-lowed Mr. Baer's words seemed to show that his appeal had not been in vain. The remainder of the evening was taken up by a musical programme. Unfortunately, the tobacco smoke, which did not seem to have an outlet, caused a heavy atmosphere which lay like a typical London for over the audience and stifed the sound of the

smoke, which did not seem to have an outlet, caused a heavy atmosphere which lay like a typical London fog over the audience and stilled the sound of the music, imposing a great strain on the artistes who had voluntarily offered their services for the general enjoyment; the conversation going on all the time did not, of course, improve matters. The indispens-table Mr. Dick was in charge of most of the numbers of the programme; specially appreciated were the characteristic French lyrics, so beautifully rendered by Mademoiselle Sophie Wyss. The evening terminated with a vote of thanks to the artistes and those responsible for the general arrangements.

The members of this committee, after exhaustive enquiries, have decided to convene a meeting (see advt, in another column) for the pur-pose of submitting their report and proposing to those interested the formation of the association.

Needless to say, the discussions previously held in this direction have been keenly followed by the authorities in Switzerland, as it is recognised that the London Swiss will thereby be offered the oppor-tunity of practising rifle shooting on the same or

similar lines as in Switzerland, where for every citizen who has been enrolled in the army this practice is compulsory. It is intended, at a later date, to take the necessary steps to secure affiliation to the parent society in Switzerland, so as to benefit

to the parent society in Switzerland, so as to benefit by Government recognition and enjoy the privileges connected with it. Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, our Minister in London, has promised all the support that lies in his power, and will take the chair at the meeting of November 24th. It is confidently hoped that all those interested will do their utmost to be present, so as to make this gathering a success worthy of the Swiss Colony; and in order to avoid unnecessary loss of time at the meeting, they are urged to apply for a copy of the draft of the pro-posed rules and provisional application forms, which, prior to the meeting, they may "read, mark, learn and inwardly digest."
