Paravicini, our Minister, had again kindly accepted the hono-rary presidency of this annual gathering, and after an opening piece by the orchestra, he welcomed in a few well-chosen words all those that had assembled to celebrate the 633rd anniversary of the foundation of Switzerland on the Rütli in 1291. His words of welcome were greatly applauded, and following another piece by the orchestra, Mr. Charles Schupbach recited two admirably selected Bernese poems, of which the first in particular, entitled "Schwyzergschicht," was greatly enjoyed by everybody.
