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**L'ARMEE SUISSE.**

Cours de répétition pour 1925.

Seront appelés au cours de répétition en 1925, à l'exception de la cavalerie: tous les officiers, les sous-officiers supérieurs et les sergents des classes de 1895 à 1904, les caporaux, les appointés et les soldats des classes de 1898 à 1904 et les classes plus jeunes qui auront accompli en 1925 l'école de recrues avant le cours de répétition; les sous-officiers supérieurs et les sergents des classes de 1893 et 1894 qui n'ont pas accompli au service actif et au cours de répétition un nombre de jours de service équivalant au moins à 10 cours de répétition (130 à 150 jours); les caporaux, les appointés et les soldats des classes de 1893 à 1897 qui n'ont pas accompli au service actif et au cours de répétition un nombre de jours de service équivalant au moins à 7 cours de répétition (91 à 112 jours); enfin les sous-officiers, les appointés et les soldats des classes plus anciennes qui ont manqué sans excuse en 1920, 1921, 1922, 1923 et 1924 un cours de répétition auquel ils étaient astreints en vertu des prescriptions en vigueur à ce moment-là et ne l'ont pas encore remplacé, ou qui ont été dispensés de l'un de ces cours avec obligation de le remplacer.

Les militaires qui ont passé entre temps dans la landwehr sont dispensés de remplacer le service manqué.

Dans la cavalerie, seront appelés: tous les officiers, tous les sous-officiers supérieurs et les sergents, caporaux, appointés et soldats des classes 1897 à 1905, qui ont accompli leur école de recrues comme recrues avant le 1er janvier 1925; en outre, les caporaux, les appointés et les soldats de la classe 1895, qui n'ont pas accompli 7 cours de répétition depuis la fin du service actif; enfin, les caporaux, les appointés et les soldats de la classe 1896 qui n'ont pas accompli trois cours de répétition depuis la fin du service actif.

Dans le 1er corps d'armée, les cours de répétition se feront par régiment; dans le 2e corps d'armée par brigades avec des exercices combinés, tandis que, dans le 3e corps d'armée, de grandes manoeuvres sont prévues.

En outre sont prévus: des cours préliminaires de cadres dans le 1er corps, cours tactiques dans le 2e et exercices pour les états-majors du 3e corps. Les cours préliminaires de cadres constituent une nouveauté et ont été institués pour répondre aux vœux de nombreux commandants de troupes, formulés dans leur rapports. Ces cours ne seront pas suivis exclusivement par les officiers d'état-major et les capitaines, mais également par les officiers subalternes.

Selon l'art. 135 de l'organisation militaire, l'Assemblée fédérale est compétente en ce qui concerne la mobilisation des cadres devant participer à cesdits cours. Cette décision peut s'effectuer sous la forme d'un arrêté fédéral inscrit au budget.

Cette innovation tend à instruire avant les cours de répétition tout le corps des officiers devant y prendre part. Ce cours aura une durée de trois jours.

La landwehr n'aura pas de cours de répétition en 1925, ainsi que le message sur la nouvelle organisation des troupes l'a annoncé.

Les exercices stratégiques de l'état-major général ne seront à l'avenir plus effectués simultanément pour tous les commandants de corps d'armée et de division, mais seront organisés par corps d'armée en rotation trisannuelle. L'école de secrétaires d'état-major n'aura pas lieu en 1925. Les cours pour officiers des étapes prévu en 1924 sera remplacé en 1925 par deux cours de répétition auxquels prendront aussi part un certain nombre d'officiers des chemins de fer, de la poste de campagne et d'automobilistes.

**FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL NEWS FROM SWITZERLAND.**

A loan of Frs. 20,000,000, on behalf of the Mortgage Bank of the Canton of Berne, is to be offered for subscription on the 10th of the present month, having been underwritten firm by the two leading banking groups and by the Syndicate of Bernese Banks. The issue price is fixed at 100%, interest being 5 1/2%. The redemption date is 1934. The Mortgage Bank will devote the proceeds of the loan exclusively to the granting of first mortgages to property owners in the canton of Berne.

A Swiss industrial syndicate is reported to have offered an advance of Frs. 12,000,000 at 12% to the Anatolian Railway Company to provide funds for the repair and improvement of the lines. As compensation, mining concessions were asked for in the vicinity of the railway, together with the rights of conducting agricultural work on these lands. The connection of the advance with such conditions has not found favour with the Turkish Government, and a counter proposal, the terms of which have not been divulged, is believed to have been made to the Swiss group.

The Swiss-Argentine Mortgage Bank in Zurich closed its year on the 30th of June last, and the amounts now available show a net profit of Frs. 891,000, which is slightly less than that achieved last year. A dividend of 8 per cent. is again being paid.

At the meeting of the Fabrique Suisse de Wagons Schlieren, S.A., which was held on the 25th of last month, shareholders approved the accounts for 1923-24, which showed a net profit of Frs. 633,339, against Frs. 637,240 in the previous year. The dividend of 8 per cent. is being repeated. The results have been satisfactory and are the first since the conclusion of the war, which compare favourably with pre-war years. Orders of some importance have been placed with the Company by the Federal Railways, which require special carriages in connection with the electrification of the lines. Various important contracts have been received for foreign concerns, as, for example, ten locomotives for Japan.

The S.A. des Ateliers de Secheron closed its accounts for the business year to March, 1924, with a net profit of Frs. 71,131, against a loss of Frs. 768,138 in the previous twelve months.

**Summer and Autumn in Switzerland.**

In spite of the bad weather that prevailed almost everywhere, the summer season of 1924 has been good on the whole in Switzerland, and even very good at certain places of resort, which received a flow of tourists such as has not been witnessed since the beginning of the war.

The mail-car services on the mountain routes have developed in a most satisfactory way. Notwithstanding the unfavourable weather conditions, 120,136 tourists made use of these cars between the 14th of July and the 31st of August, as compared with 99,800 during the corresponding period in 1923.

The passenger traffic on the different mountain railways was remarkable. On the Wengernalp Railway, for instance, the following figures were registered:—

The number of visitors during the month of August this year exceeded by about 8,000 that of the years 1912 and 1913 (54,049 and 54,489 respectively) and is very near the record figure registered in August, 1911, viz., 65,088.

The autumn season is already well advanced in the numerous well-favoured towns, the climate of which allows of pleasant holidays during the interval between the summer and winter seasons, such as the towns on the Lake of Geneva (Geneva, Lausanne, Vevey) and the well-sheltered and admirably situated towns of Clarens, Montreux and Territet. Also Lugano, Locarno, Brissago, on the borders of the Swiss-Italian Lakes, beloved of connoisseurs for their temperate climate and semitropical vegetation.

Town life resumes its intense activity in autumn. Theatres, casinos and cinemas reopen with new programmes; the various orchestras begin their grand series of concerts; universities, schools and institutes resume again their activities.
