UNIONE TICINESE. JUBILEE CELEBRATION.

Negli annali della Colonia Ticinese il Londra resterà sempre memorabile il giorno 14 Febb. p.v.

Già dal principio dell'anno scorso l'Assemblea aveva nominato un Comitato speciale di cinque membri onde avvisare ai mezzi e modi migliori a che la Commemorazione abbia a riuscire degna ed adeguata a sì fausta occasione. Il Comitato si accinse di buona lena ai preparativi. Le disposizioni prese, e le simpatie acquisiteci nella colonia ticinese e Svizzera ci danno affidamento che l'esito di questa festa supererà di gran lunga quanto abbiamo finora intrapreso.

Un Comitato d'Onore è stato nominato coll'On. Signor Ministro C. R. Paravicini quale Presidente Onorario, e Dr. Raimondo Rossi, Presidente del Consiglio di Stato del Cantone Ticino, quale Vice-Presidente.

Membri, hanno risolto di lanciare un appello a tutte le Donne Ticinesi, residenti in Inghilterra, onde raccogliere adesioni ed offerte, e regalarla una nuova bandiera alla nostra Società; vessillo che confezionato, su idea data dal Comitato, da una primaria casa di Milano riuscirà un vero capolavoro. La Commemorazione si svolgerà nei vasti locali del Ristorante dei Fratelli Monico nostri concittadini, nel seguente ordine:

Ricevimento da parte dell'On. Signor Ministro dei rappresentanti delle Società Svizzere consorelle, della Colonia Svizzera e Ticinese ed intervenuti. Presentazione ed inaugurazione della nuova bandiera, Banchetto—Ballo—e "Cabaret-Show" (Café Concert). Interspersi vi saranno i discorsi di circostanza.

E un dovere di tutti i ticinesi di intervenire il tale occasione: non si tratta solo del Giubileo di una Società di Beneficenza. SWISS RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

The inclemency of the weather and the uncertainty of travelling facilities on account of the railway strike kept away from Wednesday's meeting a good many of those members who are otherwise keenly interested in the activities of the Rifle Association. In the absence of the treasurer, Mr. F. Rohr, who is suffering from tonsillitis, the president gave a short account of the financial position; the subscriptions were coming in freely, about half of the 58 members having already fulfilled their financial obligations for the present year. Liberal advantage was being taken of the facilities which the committee had arranged for miniature rifle shooting at the Regent Street Polytechnic, where every Saturday afternoon between 20 and 30 members competed with each other, while the ground at Hendon is being prepared. As regards the latter, a very encouraging report was submitted to the meeting by a few members who last Sunday had inspected this shooting range. The ground at Hendon comprises something like 17 acres, and seems to be quite suitable for other sporting activities, such as lawn tennis, skittle alley, etc. At present a 100-metres automatic target is being erected, and it is confidently anticipated that, when once open-air shooting on our ground is in full swing, a sufficient influx of new members will enable the association to proceed with the somewhat heavy expense of erecting a couple of 300-metre targets. A great attraction will be the fact that ground shooting can be practised on Sundays, and that Hendon is easily accessible from all parts of London. A lively discussion took place as to whether the association should prepare a team to compete in Switzerland this summer at the "Tir Fédéral" in Aarau; one member expressed his regret that the ground in Hendon was not ready, as he knew of a good many crack shots in the Swiss Colony who kept away from the association, as they considered miniature rifle shooting mere child's play. Seeing that the ground at Hendon should be ready within a month's time, the opinion prevailed that the moment would then be opportune for an intensive propaganda.

Mr. V. BURKHART.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. V. Burkhardt, which took place on Friday, January 18th, at St. James' Hospital, Wandsworth Common, to which institution he had been removed a few days previously. He was buried on Wednesday, the 23rd inst., at Hendon Park Cemetery, Mill Hill, a number of personal friends and representatives of the Union Helvetia accompanying their friend on his last journey; the coffin was covered with beautiful wreaths and other floral tributes. Earlier in the morning a service was held in the Swiss Church by the Rev. Hoffmann-de Visme.

Mr. Burkhardt, who leaves a widow, was born in Zurich in 1861 and has resided in London for the last forty years. He was keenly interested and instrumental in the development of the Union Helvetia, the largest Swiss society in this country. The following particulars as to his disinterested activity have been supplied to us by one of the officials.

He was one of the founders of the Hotel Employees' Society "Union Suisse" in London in 1882, which had its headquarters at the Swiss Hotel, Old Compton Street, and which society then amalgamated with the U.H. when founded in 1886. He was a member of the first Committee of the U.H., London Branch, and also a member of the first Landesverwaltung England, in which he took for many years a leading part, especially in building the present club. In 1912 he joined, by special request of the Central Administration in Lucerne, the present Club House Committee, in which he acted as Vice-President. In 1921 he succeeded Mr. Bodenehr as Chairman of the Board of Directors of the U.H. Company, Ltd. For his excellent services to the Society and Club, the Honorary Membership was conferred on him by the Delegates' Meeting of the U.H. in Lucerne in 1922.

Since the foundation of the Society he has almost always been in office on the various committees in London, either as chairman or otherwise. Of all the founders of the Society in London he is the only one who died in office.
