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stood of all save the close observer, and lies open to the attack of the first literary lout who would prick her with his little pen.

Your Artists are Your Ambassadors.

I do not for a moment advocate vulgar national propaganda, shouting empty slogans of patriotism, springing from the false pride of ignorance. Such a spirit is worse than none at all, and one might suggest with a certain truth that the United States are at once the most advertised and most ridiculed of peoples. No, there is but one Ambassador who may unfold the meaning of a country's soul and that is the artist of its soil, its writers, its painters, its composers. And if their work is carried in the hearts of its people, and especially those who represent it in all corners of the globe, that country will not be misunderstood.

Great will be your indignation, my masters, as you read, but I submit that you yourselves show in this respect no great service for Switzerland. To come, as the English say, to 'brass tacks,' has a translation of Gottfried Keller been arranged and exploited in English? Has the work of Geiger ever been shown in London? What effort has been made to have even part of 'Andromeda' or 'La Flute de jade' played here? At any rate, if any such efforts were made, they were abortive. And my point remains that if Swiss life and character had been interpreted in London with any spirit and consistency, these ignorant attacks would never appear, or if appearing, be obviously ridiculous.

You have Great Ambassadors.

I greatly fear that many a reader will be saying as he reads: "Ah, we have no great artists. For example, it is well for France, whose glory can be sounded from a thousand trumpets from Villon to Appolinaire, from Rameau to Debussy. These trumpets will resound in the corridors of time as long as there is civilisation on earth. But we Swiss have no such artists, we should be shy..." And here I would take up the issue and contradict, for it is not the quality of the artist, but the sincerity with which he interprets the spirit of his country which counts. And of such many great ones have sprung from Swiss soil.

Your artists are there, but do you know or care? How many of you have ever realised, much less said, that the British have nobody of his time in their art of the same gigantic stature as Hodler? How many of you have tried to express, in this borrowed English tongue, the soul of Carl Spitteler? How many of you would be ready to take up the cause of 'La Grande Peur dans la Montagne,' and argue that it was the greatest atmospheric work of last year, at any rate? How many of you even heard of Ramuz? How many of you even took the trouble to pick up Johan Knittel's 'Into the Abyss,' that great Swiss tragedy? But enough, for I have made my point, which is reason enough why Switzerland is so little understood by the nations.
