NOUVELLE SOCIÉTÉ HELVÉTIQUE.

The Nouvelle Société Helvétique, which has changed its Headquarters some years ago to the Swiss House, Fitzroy Square, W. 1., remains true to its old traditions: to develop the national spirit; to keep in close touch with the homeland and make known at home the activities of the Swiss Colony in London; to exercise on public opinion both in Switzerland and in the U.K., an influence for the amelioration of the relations between the two countries.

The Society holds monthly meetings, the chief attraction of which is usually a causerie on some important subject by an expert from home or from the Colony.

Although since the War the activity of the Society has been somewhat curtailed, a great deal of unobtrusive work is being done in many directions.

SWISS BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

The Swiss Benevolent Society of Swiss House, 34, Fitzroy Square, London, W.1., was founded in 1870, for the relief of needy Swiss, irrespective of sex, language, or religious belief. Originally confined to London, it now extends its beneficial influence also to some of the provinces in the Southern part of England. Applicants must produce proof of their Swiss Nationality. A special committee meets at the above address on Monday evenings to consider all applications with great care. Wherever possible the unfortunate countrymen are helped to become self-supporting again or then they are paid their journey back to Switzerland. A visiting lady, employed by the Committee is in attendance every weekday, between 2 and 4 p.m. The General Committee, composed of the Presidents of all Swiss Societies of the Metropolitan and a number of Swiss residents who take an interest in the work, meet every three months to pass the accounts and to discuss the most important cases.

All members of the board give their work free of charge, which makes it possible to devote the greatest part of the funds to the poor themselves. The annual expenditure now reaches £3,000 and it is no small task to find this large sum. All countrymen are therefore earnestly requested to contribute towards the aims of the Society, by sending either funds or clothing or boots, to 34, Fitzroy Square.

SWISS CHORAL SOCIETY.

Male voice choir singing is one of the characteristics of the Swiss, and it is the aim of the Swiss Choral Society to uphold this national art in our Colony.

Unfortunately in recent years the Choir has to a great extent been handicapped by the immigration restrictions in force in this country, and we should, therefore, be particularly pleased to see those of our compatriots join the Choir who are permanently resident here. After all a large Colony such as ours should be able to produce a much stronger choir than exists at present, and we make a special appeal to every Swiss in London, who is a lover of our beautiful folk songs, to join the Swiss Choral Society. Apart from concerts, the Society arranges social gatherings for their active and contributing members and friends. Rehearsals of the Choir take place every Friday evening.

SWISS GYMNASIAC SOCIETY. MEN, BOYS, LADIES.

The Society (Schweizerturnverein London—Société Suisse de Gymnastique Londres) carries on Gymnastics (Kunstturnen) and Wrestling (Nationalturnen) on Swiss lines at their headquarters in the Union Helvetia Club, 1, Gerrard Place, Shaftesbury Avenue, W.1. Work is being done by the section and individually at all the apparatus used at home, namely Horizontal Bar, Parallel Bars, Pomelled Horse, Rings, Free Exercises, etc., whilst wrestling in Catch-as-Catch-can and Swiss style is being practised. Gymnasts compete in the English Championships and in the Gymnastic Festivals in Switzerland (laurels were won in 1925 and 1928), whilst Wrestlers compete in the English Championships and held the Desborough Cup in 1920 and 1925.—
