### Relaying News by Gun-fire.

Many have been the devices that have been used by newspapermen and agencies to get "one ahead" of rivals, but shot guns are surely novel.

This was the method by which Mr. A. V. Darosa, the British United Press correspondent at Lisbon, "scooped" the start of the two Swiss airmen, MM. Kaeser and Lusher, on their tragic Atlantic flight, on which they were lost.

The two airmen had decided to start from a field some twenty-five miles out of Lisbon, which was inaccessible so far as telephone or telegraph was concerned. Indeed there were no communications at all.

Mr. Darosa enlisted the aid of several men (one of them at the field). When the airmen took off, the man at the field fired his gun, the news being relayed until it reached the village of Vila Franca several miles away, where a telephone was being kept open to the cable office—and Mr. Darosa was first with the news.

### No Theological Distinctions.

Alpine air has devastating effects on theological distinctions. As a proof of this my friend, the Rev. M. E. Aubrey, the secretary of the Baptist Union, tells me an interesting story. Mr. Aubrey has just returned from Macolin, Switzerland, where he has been acting during the vacation as a Nonconformist chaplain. The Roman Catholics, the Anglicans, and the Nonconformists conducted worship in turns in the same church.

On one Sunday Mr. Aubrey conducted a joint service of members of the Church of England and of the Free Church. Such a thing could hardly happen in England, and probably explains why most reunion conferences are held among the Alpine mountains.

### Reduction in Air Fares.

A reduction of air fares between London and Paris as from October 6th has been announced by Imperial Airways.

The air fare on the 8 a.m., Argosy air liner for Paris, including motor-car journeys from the centres of the cities to the aerodromes at either end is to be reduced from £4 15s. to £3 10s., which is lower than the first-class boat and train fare between London and Paris on the Dover-Calais route. The fare on Imperial Airways' de Luxe service leaving London at noon daily, will be reduced from £5 15s. to £4 15s., while the fare on the Handley Page Napier air liner flying between London and Switzerland will be cut from £7 10s. to £7.

### "DAS WERK."

*Das Werk.* (Verlag Gebr. Fretz A. G. Zurich.). The August issue of this valuable periodical gives us a good description of various examples of what in our days they call "modern building" (Zeitgemässes Bauen). The more they produce such kind of architecture the less I am convinced of these architects taking their artistic duty at heart. Usefulness is one of their motives; their productions bear the sign of ugliness. One should not abuse a landscape to make trials in this line of art which are merely theoretical. We blame a poet who, although he may be called modern, expresses his ideas without giving them an artistic form. What we feel is thoroughly lacking is the inspiration. There must be a harmony in every expression of art; there must be moreover harmony between landscape and building. You cannot imagine the dome of Cologne standing on top of the acropolis. We blame this way of construction for forcing the issues; of making inexcusable essays of a very bad taste. Art has always lived upon inspiration, but this "art" certainly has no inspiration whatever. The technical news at the end of this issue must be very valuable to the experts. H.
