NOUVELLE SOCIÉTÉ HELVÉTIQUE.

The regular monthly meeting of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique was held at Swiss House on Wednesday, 15th May, when the business portion of the meeting preceded a most interesting causerie by Mr. Robert Schiess, formerly of the Swiss Papal Guard in Rome.

Mr. Schiess gave a most vivid account of the constitution, the life, the duties and other matters of the Guard and was listened to with enormous interest by the large audience present. Mr. Schiess, to make the lecture more interesting, actually appeared in the picturesque uniform of the Guard, and after having answered a number of questions he consented to the general request of the audience and produced his "zither." To hear Mr. Schiess on this instrument is something unexpected and wholly delightful: he is a recognised virtuoso on this beautiful though old-fashioned instrument. The best proof of the great appreciation of the audience is the fact that they would not let him go, even after the meeting was officially closed, but clamoured for more of the beautiful melodies he gave us from his repertoire.

It is the intention of the Council to organise similar evenings for the future, as this one has proved so attractive to the students of Swiss House. Mr. Masterman's co-operation is hereby very thankfully acknowledged.

BÜCHER-BESPRECHUNG.

In der Märznummer des *WERK* der schweizerischen Monatsschrift für Architektur, freie Kunst und angewandte Kunst finden wir unter dem Sammeltitle "Umbauten" eine Gruppe von Bauten der letzten Jahre vereinigt, die zu den verschiedensten Zwecken in ihrem Bestand verändert worden sind. Der Umbau des Klosters Allerheiligen in Schaffhausen zum Museum—durch die Architekten Schäfer & Risch—eröffnet die Reihe. Es folgen die Umbauten der Domaine Merlinge bei Genf, des Schuhhauses Capitol in Zürich; Ladenausbauten; schlichter und rücksichtslose Lösungen, wie sie das Leben bringt.

Es folgt ein Essay über Paris aus einem demnächst erscheinenden Werk "Europäische Gedichte" von Herbert Moos, eine Publikation des in Paris lebenden Schweizer Malers Wilhelm Schmid, eine etwas bittere Abhandlung "Reglementierung im Namen der Schönheit" mit Belegen aus dem Kanton Tessin.

Das neue Heft des *Werk* (April) hebt an mit einer Erinnerung an die Bourdelle Ausstellung in Basel: eine grosse Aufnahme der "Eloquencia" ruft den starken Eindruck wieder wach der von jenen reich und gross entwickelten Sockelfiguren des Alvear-Denkmal ausging.

Dann Villen: grosse und kleine, geplante und ausgeführte; die Villa wollte bereits als abgestandene, überlebte Form abgetan werden, hier ist der gegenseitige Standpunkt vertreten. Zwei schwierige Architektur Wettbewerbe: Die Universitätsbauten in Bern und das Kunstmuseum von Basel werden unter besonderen Gesichtspunkten betrachtet. Es folgt eine Publikation von Arbeiten Albert Kohlens. Den Beschluss macht die Brille mit dem Thema "Wie eine Ausstellung gemacht wird."
