Louis Moritz Delaraye.

The Swiss Colony in Birmingham had a very great shock when it learned of the untimely death of a dear compatriot, Mr. Louis Delaraye, the General Manager of the Grand Hotel and the Midland Hotel in Birmingham. Mr. Delaraye expired suddenly at his residence in Shirley, Birmingham, on Saturday afternoon, the 1st of June, at the age of 53. He was attending to his business in the morning as usual and appeared to be in good health, but on arriving at his home he complained of feeling unwell and expired shortly afterwards owing to heart-trouble.

Mr. Delaraye came to Birmingham some 15 years ago from London, where he had been occupying a responsible position at the Savoy Hotel, and no doubt he is well known there amongst a large number of friends and acquaintances. Here in Birmingham he was one of the best known and most capable men in his profession, highly respected and esteemed by everyone.

Although Mr. Delaraye, for some reason or other, never participated very actively in the functions of the Swiss Club in Birmingham, nevertheless he was always ready and willing to assist quietly and indirectly. He was an ardent and keen patriot, who always had the interest of his native country at heart. He attained his position by untiring energy and merit. His memory will be cherished by all who knew him.

The remains of the deceased were cremated at Perry Bar, Birmingham, on Wednesday, June 5th. A large number of his friends and compatriots attended to pay their last sad tribute of respect. By special request no flowers or wreaths were placed on the coffin, but instead of that it was draped with the emblem of our nationality, the Swiss flag.
